A WOMAN STRANGLED.

MORE MYSTERY IN THE PORT STANLEY CASE.

The Strangulation May Have Occurred by Water-Inquest Not Fin-ished-No One to Identify the Body Found on Port Stanley

London, Ont., July 20.-Up till yesterday the young woman whose body was found in Lake Erie at Port Stanley had not been identified. Many residents of London and St. Thomas viewed the remains, but none were able to establish her identity. A jury, presided over by Coroner Grey of St. Thomas, heard evidence on Saturday that the woman's death was

Saturday that the woman's death was due to strangulation. Mystery still envelopes the case to a certain degree, not only as to the woman's identity but as to the circumstances surrounding her death. The physicians who performed the post-morten examination state that it is uncertain whether death opcurred before or after the body entered the water. The woman may have been strangled by water or by a person's hand. The inquest will be continued in a few days.

feet six and a half inches high, thirtythree inches at the bust, wearing a
number four Oxford tie shoe. She
had light brown eyes, dark brown hair,
full, face, heavy neck and rather flatthere is the cheek, full, face, heavy neck and rather flat-tened nose; a mole on the right cheek, was slightly built and weighs about 110 pounds. She wore a black cloth dress with figured silk waist trimmed with velvet, white basket worked straw hat with velvet trimmings, and green ribbons, lined with muslin She was about 35 years old.

Fell Off a Hay Waggon.

London, Ont., July 29.-Geo. Me-Guffin, a prominent farmer, living on lot 6, 8th concession of London township, was accidentally killed vesterday afternoon, while drawing hay from one of his fields. He died almost instantly.
