## TROUBLE OVER COTTON INSURANCE HURTS TRADE

Federal Bureau Can Only Underwrite Cargoes Carried in American Bottoms; Bankers Not

Washington, November 6.-Informati here from domestic shippers indicates that some little difficulty is being experienced in obtaining the proodation in foreign shipments of cotto per accommodation in foreign simplicates of colors and other commodities. It was learned to-day that this difficulty arises from the fact that the British law stipulates that no war risk insurance is to pro tect the shippers from seisure by the British. Thus it follows that insurance underwritten by the British companies does not always protect the shippers from onfiscation of the shipments by the Allies.

At present, it is said, there are about 20 foreign companies in the United States and account 20 toreign the united and cargoes.
