ENGLISH SOCCER
TEAM IS COMINGCon. Jones Cable That Ar-
rangement Has Been
Completed.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 16.—Cableing from London, England to A. P. Garvey, a local sporting writer, Con Jones, the Vancouver lacrosse official, says all arrangements have been made for the Canadian tour of an English team this summer. The British team will be a representative one, and will be accompanied to Canada by H. H. Allingham, who will represent the British association.

The tour will extend over ten weeks, the players arriving in Canada in May. Con Jones, will outline the itinerary for the Britishers and arrange his eastern schedule upon his arrival in Montreal on March 1 from the Old Country. F. O. B. Hawes, secretary of the British association, will also make the trip. The tour will be financed by the Vancouver magnate. Mr. Jones adds that the English football association officials have assured him that they will permit the English cup finalists to tour America next year.

CONSOLATION SERIES

HAMILTON, Feb. 16.—Leroy Awrey, manager of the Hamilton Centennials, was communicated with Saturday morning asking to go into a group with the Preston, London, Paris and Toronto Riverside clubs, which have been runners-up in their groups. It will be known as the consolation series. Mr. Awrey notified the men behind the affair that if suitable arrangements can be made with the management of the Aleris' rink the local club would go in. A meeting will be held at Preston on Monday night to draw up the schedule.

REMARKABLE GAME

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C., Feb. 16.—The most remarkable hockey game on local ice this season ended in a victory for Victoria over Westminster by a score of 2 to 1 Friday night. The game went 36 minutes overtime before the league champions could outscore the locals. It was fast all the way through and some lightning plays were pulled off. Dunderdale, who is leading the league in number of goals scored, was again in form and snatched the game from Westminster.

CANADIAN RELAY TEAM
BEAT CARLISLE COLLEGEMel. Brock's Team Allowed the In-
dians Forty Yards and Then Won
by Five Inches in 3.27 2-5.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 16.—The joint annual indoor athletic meet of Johns Hopkins University and Fifth Regiment Maryland National Guard here Saturday night brought together the largest and best field of contenders in these games.

Athletics of national and in territorial reputation were entered in the various running races, prominent among them being Brock, Canadian champion miler; Jack Tait, of Toronto, and Patterson, of University of Pennsylvania, intercollegiate champion of America for the 100 yard dash.

The Canadians scored in the one mile relay race and the 880-yard open handicap. The one mile relay race was won by Toronto Y. M. C. A. (Tessier, Brock, Tait, Phillips) from Carlisle Indians School (Squire, Conns, Plenty, Guyon). Time 3:27 2-5. Toronto allowed the Indians 40 yards handicap and won by five yards.

In the 880-yard open handicap, Cooke, University of Virginia (four yards), 1; Tessier, Toronto Y. M. C. A. (5 yards), 2; Wilson, Baltimore Y. M. C. A. (3 yards), 3. Time 2:00 4-5.

University of Virginia won the meet, scoring 21 points; Georgetown 12; and Johns Hopkins, 3; 6 points.

Rube Deneau Can Hire and Fire
Red Sox Players as He Sees FitSole Control of Club
Given to Rube Deneau
By President NelsonBrantford Manager Arrives in City for Conference
—He Has Several Good Players Under
His Wing Already.

George ("Rube") Deneau, the newly appointed manager of the Red Sox arrived in the city yesterday and immediately got into communication with President T. J. Nelson with respect to the training of the club this year.

When interviewed this morning by a Courier reporter the "Rube" made the following statement: "I'm going to play ball with Brantford this year and I didn't apologize to the London directors either. I've got lines on some good material and you can assure the fans that Brantford will be up in the running when the curtain rings down at the close of the season."

The team will train here providing Agricultural Park dries up early enough. In case it does not Manager Deneau will take the team to Mt. Clemens, Mich., to undergo spring training.

Manager Deneau has strings on a number of first class players, including a whole new infield and a number of new pitchers. So far Manager Deneau has been unable to land a good left hander, but has his eyes on one or two good men whom he hopes to land in a few days. The team will report to him here on or about the 15th of April, and will immediately commence spring training.

President Nelson wore a sunny smile when seen this morning and gave out the following statement: "Manager Deneau has sole charge of the Brantford Red Sox and has been given authority to sign or release such players as he sees fit. The only condition attached to this being that he provide the fans with a first class ball team."

Inflammation set in and the big player was hustled off to the hospital on Saturday to undergo an operation. It is not likely he will play again this season. Vancouver and Victoria meet here on Tuesday and the capitals have a chance to win the championship. As it now stands Victoria must lose all the remaining games and Vancouver win the string to give the Millionaires the title.

CHALLENGED TO FIGHT

MONTREAL, Feb. 14.—A special London cable to the Daily Mail says: Sir Sidney Buxton, governor-general-designate of South Africa, was eight years ago the recipient of a challenge to fight a duel. He was then post-master-general and controverted a statement emanating from Lloyd George, who was then negotiating on the subject of wireless telegraphy. Col. Hozier, the father-in-law of Winston Churchill, who was then secretary of the Admiralty, got so angry over the incident that he sent a challenge to Mr. Buxton to name his weapons and meet him in Belgium and there fight out the matter. Mr. Buxton destroyed the letter.

LANGFORD EN ROUTE

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Sam Langford, the negro, heavyweight pugilist of Boston, left London on the boat train for Liverpool Saturday on his return to America, where he is to fight Carl Morris, the heavyweight. George F. Covey, world's professional court tennis champion, also was among the passengers. He is going to the United States to make final arrangements for his match with Jay Gould, amateur court tennis champion, which will probably be played in the United States.

ORANGEMEN TO MEET.

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—The Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West will hold its fifty fifth annual meeting in Guelph March 11 next. It is expected the Grand Master, Fred Dane will retire and be succeeded by Dr. J. J. Williams of Woodstock the present deputy grand master. In that event Mayor Hocken of Toronto will be promoted from associate deputy to deputy grand master. Another officer expected to retire is C. A. B. Jennings, grand director of ceremonies.

TORONTOS EASILY
DEFEAT ONTARIOSLeaders of N.H.A. Beat Mur-
phy's Six by 3-1 Score
at Toronto.

TORONTO, Feb. 16.—Torontos won from Ontarios in the National Hockey Association game here Saturday night by 3 to 1. Sammy Heberts' good work in goal for the Ontarios was the outstanding feature of the game. He received a cut three inches long on the left side of the face by the puck which had been deflected from its course. Notwithstanding his wound he resumed play as soon as it was stitched up.

Torontos won because their shots were made from closer in, while the Ontarios were forced to shoot from outside the defence or from an awkward angle.

Quebec in Overtime.

QUEBEC, Feb. 16.—One of the most exciting and hardly contested hockey matches seen here for many moons, was that which took place Saturday night, when Quebec succeeded in defeating the Wanderers, after seven minutes overtime play, by a score of 7 to 6. The play was very even for three periods and a remarkable part of the contest was that in each period both teams scored exactly a similar number of goals, the regular time ending with Quebec 6, Wanderers 6.

Although the teams were evenly matched up to this time, the overtime was all Quebec's, as they were nearly the whole time in the Wanderers' territory; and were it not for the visiting team's strong defence, the sudden death game would have been scored in short order, as it was only on two or three occasions that Quebec's goal was in danger. Although the match was fast and the checking hard it was clean and not a man injured.

Canadiens 1; Ottawa 0.

MONTREAL, Feb. 16.—With players dropping in their tracks, some staggering from exhaustion and others from rough play, the Canadiens and Ottawas struggled for nearly seven minutes overtime in their scheduled National Hockey Association fixture at the Arena on Saturday night before the Flying Frenchmen earned a decision by one goal. To the staggering from exhaustion goes the honor of scoring the only goal of the most gruelling contest ever witnessed in the history of hockey in Montreal.

The play was marked by more rough tactics than any witnessed in Montreal in years. The penalty sheet showed \$80, one of the largest amounts ever collected by the N. H. A., more than half being against Ottawas players.
