THE SITUATION

The Italians have commenced the invasion of Austria, and at this writing have penetrated quite a distance across her borders. The rapidity of the stroke, following so closely upon the formal declaration of war, manifests a state of preparedness which augurs well for future operations.

From all indications it seems to be quite generally felt in the Old Land that the Dardanelles operations have proved a mistake on the basis of extending too much force when men and munitions are so much needed elsewhere.

THE NEW BRITISH CABINET

Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, who succeeds Churchill in the Admiralty, comes of Cecil stock, the members of which have been continuously prominent in the public affairs of Great Britain since the time of Elizabeth.

The Cecils constitute one of the very rare instances of a family remaining in prominence in affairs of State for generation after generation—it is usually a man of great prominence and comparative deterioration for his descendants.

LONDON, May 26.—A telegram from Harwich says that a British destroyer arrived there this morning, bringing a German sub-destroyer and a mechanical from a Taube aeroplane, which was found floating in the North Sea.

The aeroplane had been forced by engine trouble to descend. After the Germans had been rescued the aeroplane was sunk.

ITALIANS OCCUPY

Everywhere on the 24th our troops took the offensive, occupying Corchella, Montizzo, Tonio and Ponte Caffaro in Val Guidicaria, the territory north of Ferrara and Monte Baldo.

They also occupied Monte Reoro and Monte Poppa on the slopes north of Lessini; Monte Pasubia and Monte Baffalen at the extremity of Agno and Leomang valleys and the defiles of Val Brenta. We took a number of prisoners.

In Cadore we occupied all the frontier defiles. The enemy's medium calibre artillery opened fire on the Bay of Mistrina, but without results.

On the Carnia frontier on the night of the 24th we took by a bayonet attack the defile of Val D'Inferno and the extremity of Val Dagno.

On the Friuli frontier on the 25th in the middle of the Isonzo region we successfully continued our offensive operations near Catorretto. We have disposed troops on the conquered heights between the Judrio and the Isonzo. Medium calibre artillery of the Austrians at Santa Maria and Santa Lucia, to the southwest of Tolmino opened fire on the heights between the Judrio and Isonzo, but without result.

On the Lower Isonzo we also continued our offensive to attain the line of the river. Everywhere the enemy retired, destroying bridges and cutting communications.

Our aviators bombarded the power house and railroad station at Monfalcone.
