PARADING SOCIALISTS IN NEW YORK

Are Attacked by Soldiers, Sailors and Marines

New York, Nov. 13.—Soldiers, sailors and marines engaged last night in a fight with several hundred members of the Socialist party of Greater New York, who with red flags pinned to their jackets had paraded up Fifth avenue on their way to attend a meeting in Carnegie Hall, at which funds were to be raised for the defence of Thomas J. Mooney, labor leader, under death sentence in California. More than 100 police reserves had to use their night sticks freely before the disturbance was quelled. Apparently the soldiers at first thought the parade was for the celebration of Germany's defeat, but when they saw a red flag being carried at the head of the column, they hesitated and followed the party. In front of the hall a few individual fights were merged into a free-for-all.

"CEASE FIRE" ORDER GIVEN CANADIANS

Deliverers of Mons Were Greeted Rapturously by Population

FIGHTING AT AN END. By Courier Leased Wire. With the British Army in Belgium, Monday, Nov. 13.—(By the Associated Press).—The population of Mons today greeted the troops cheering madly their deliverers. Their glad cries must have reached the ears of the Germans outside the walls of the town.

Early this morning a crisp, graphic order to fire at 11 o'clock was distributed to all units with a further order to maintain defensive precautions, but to have an intercourse with the enemy. The advance continued, the gunners racing forward to the advance batteries seeking the honor of firing the final shot.

Exactly at 11 o'clock the firing stopped like clockwork. Puffs of British airplanes dropped showers of signal lights which descended with the momentous message to those below.

There was joy in plenty among the British troops at the first blush of peace, but there was little in the nature of demonstrations. Tommy Atkins was unable to realize that the announcement was true, although his heart was burning with the hope of going back to his wife and baby in "Blighty." So he stood and waited for something to happen, he knew not what.

This could not be the end after all the stumbles and terror he had been through.

One of these tattered and mud-spattered veterans came to the correspondent's automobile and asked, frowningly, he asked: "Is it all through?"

Being assured he sped back to his companions to confirm the good news.

This afternoon celebrations and rejoicing were making the old town of Mons vibrate. Bands and pipes led marching thousands about the city.
