Church Re-opening.

On Sunday last special re-opening services were held in the Baptist Church at Plum Hollow, which has been almost entirely rebuilt and much beautified during the summer. At the morning service a large congregation assembled, when the Rev. S. Sheldon conducted a most impressive and soul-stirring meeting. Another service was held at half past two in the afternoon, when the church was crowded with an interested congregation. Mr. Sheldon preached a practical sermon from I Cor. 16. 13, and made an impression for good upon his hearers. The collections were for the purpose of paying for the lamps, etc., in the church. The pastor had the satisfaction of announcing that all the expense of the repairs had been provided for by subscription. The contractor was A. N. Sherman, who undertook the work for \$625.00. This sum was increased to nearly \$700 by extras and unforeseen contingencies. This church is one of the pioneer places of worship in the back country, and was built 43 years ago under the supervision of Eld. R. Nichols. It is situated on a very beautiful site, the rocky bluff on which it stands overlooking the picturesque valley of Plum Hollow, than which there is no more beautiful pastoral scene in the country. The building now presents a fine appearance. The pitch of the roof has been raised considerably and the walls are finished in Rosendale cement, pencilled in imitation of cut stone. The inside of the edifice presents to the eye a neat and even artistic appearance, and does credit to the energetic committee which had charge of the improvements. We congratulate the pastor and the members of the church on the successful termination of their efforts to beautify the sanctuary.

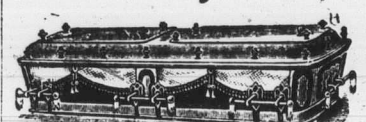

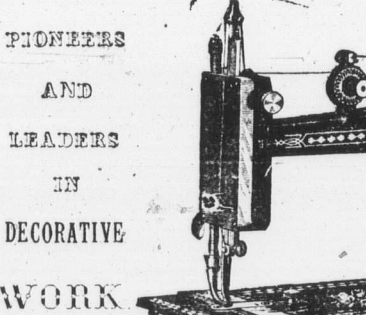
