LIFE IN DAWSON; A PROGRESSIVE TOWN

According to the latest official
information, Dawson City is being
transformed into a town with a good
deal of general business beside gold
mining, and is acquiring a settled and
a civilized aspect.
There are now five miles of mac-
adamized streets in the city. The set-
tled population is about seven thou-
sand, nearly half of the total popu-
lation of the Klondike mining dis-
trict. Two hundred of the Canadian
Mounted Police maintain order.
The Catholics, Episcopians, Pres-
byterians, Methodists and Salvation
Army all have well built places of
worship. Five small hospitals are
maintained for the sick. Three daily
newspapers are published, thirty-
three lawyers practice in the courts,
three theatres afford amusement and
there are four mutual benefit soci-
eties.

Three companies with twenty-three
steamers give facilities for freight
and passengers on the upper Yukon,
and eight other steamboat companies
with forty-one steamers handle the
traffic of the river between Dawson
and the sea.
There has been a large drop in the
prices of many commodities as the
Dawson and the ocean have improved.
Coffee is now sold at 50 cents a
pound, canned meats at 50 cents a
can, fresh beef (the cattle being
driven into the country at the low
price of 25 cents a pound), pork
and fish at 50 cents a pound, butter
35 cents a pound, eggs at 50 cents a
dozen, potatoes at \$2.50 a bushel,
and oranges at 50 cents a dozen. On
the whole, however, living, judged by
our standards, is still very dear.
Many cigars sell as high as a dollar
apiece.

The wages of miners is \$2 a day,
and even at that rate their savings
are not very large. It was estimated
that in 1901 the average purchasing
power of \$1 in eastern Canada was
equal to that of \$6 at Dawson. The
ratio in 1902 was estimated at \$1 to
\$4.50, showing that the high prices
at Dawson are gradually decreasing.
The smallest piece of money that
has currency in the city is 25
cents. The daily papers are smaller
than the one-cent papers of Eastern
Canada, but they sell for 25 cents
a number, \$4 by the month and \$40
by the year, payable in advance. A
well-known person in Dawson, who
recently said that the period of fancy
prices had now passed away forever,
was compelled to admit that he had
just paid a quarter of a dollar for
a pair of ordinary shoestrings.

Rents are still very high. An office
which in Eastern Canada would be
rented for \$80 a month costs \$150
on the Klondike. A table waitress
receives \$100 a month and a maid
of all work earns from \$75 to \$125
a month.
Hotel charges are high, but not
exorbitant. For this out-of-the-way
part of the world. A small room
costs \$2.50 a day. Breakfast and
lunch are served at 75 cents each,
dinner at \$1, and the meals are bet-
ter than might be expected so far
away in the wilderness.

It is probable that for many years
the Klondike region will be very im-
portant in the cold industry, though
it may never again equal its past
annual record. The placers of the
Klondike yielded according to offi-
cial figures in 1897, \$2,250,000 with
no machinery and no roads, so that
transportation was very difficult.
The output in 1898 was \$10,000,000
and in 1899 \$10,000,000.

In 1900, thanks to the employment
of machinery and to the facilities
given by many well built roads, the

placers turned out \$22,275,000. All
the other gold centres of Canada
in that year yielded only \$6,000,000.
The gold product of the Klondike
in 1901 amounted to \$24,000,000,
which was \$1,000,000 more than the
output from all our gold mines in
Alaska during the same year. It is
not expected that the Klondike pro-
duction in 1902 will equal that of
1901, for no new discovery of gold
was made during the year.
It was due entirely to the wonder-
ful development of gold mining in
the Klondike that Canada attained
in 1901 the third place among the
gold producing countries. It was
surpassed only by the United States
with \$75,638,700, and Australia
with \$75,283,200, and took its place
in advance of Russia, which mined
\$23,000,900.

The Klondike in the first three
years after its discovery, yielded one
hundred times more gold than the
Witwatersrand in the first three
years after gold was found in that
remarkable region, and nothing is
more certain than that we have not
yet begun to fathom the wonderful
mineral wealth of Alaska and the
other northern parts of North Amer-
ica.

Hardening Aluminum.
A process with the object of increas-
ing the mechanical properties of
aluminum has been patented in Ger-
many, says Kuhlhorn's Trade Review.
The process is interesting in the
sense that it opens up a view to the
possibility to employ aluminum to
new uses in giving it certain qualities
of endurance and resistance which
are wanting in its pure state. It is
well known that aluminum works
badly with certain cutting tools and
files. It has been shown that the al-
loying of aluminum and magnesium
have a marked superiority over pure
aluminum, but less malleable and ductile.
The authors observe that if alu-
minum is alloyed to 2 to 10 per cent
of magnesium the alloy obtained is
hardly to be distinguished from alu-
minum, but when this alloy is passed
several times through a flattening
mill, heated each time towards 400-500
deg. C., its properties are modified.
The alloy cuts and files well with
though it was charged with magne-
sium. It has preserved, on the other
hand, the ductility and malleability
of pure aluminum.

contained virulent, that is active,
bacilli of tuberculosis. I am at least

quiring attention in this respect
fine of 15s. each was inflicted on two
men at Perth the other day for spit-
ting in a railway carriage. The pro-
secution was undertaken by the
County Council of Glamorgan. All
such legislation is not only needed,
but its beneficial effect will not be
limited to suppressing a nuisance.
Through the operation of the law the
thoughts of the nation will be di-
rected toward the prevention of dis-
ease, and this a one must be regarded
as an eminently desirable result.

THE REAL KHARTOUM.
There have been some marvellous
stories of the transformation of
Khartoum under British rule. One
writer saw a vision of a stately
city, with beautiful lawns and gar-
dens, wide streets, churches, a col-
lege and magnificent Government of-

red brick faced with stone; a rail-
way running into the city, and fast
steamers plying on the Nile. All this

city, says, "Khartoum is still all
more than a big village; the palace
and Government offices are nothing
worth talking about; the churches
are non-existent; the Gordon col-

palace; the railway is a narrow-
gauge track, on which a miniature
engine draws the material for the
new Government buildings; the trav-
eller can only enter the stately city
on his own legs or on the back of
a native donkey; and the fast steam-
ers plying on the Nile would not
compare with the fleet of the late
Thames Steamboat Company. Khartoum,
therefore, hardly seems to rival
Paris, or even London, at present—
whatever it may do in time."—
