AMERICAN FIRE FIGHTERS. They Are Admitted to Be the Best In

the World. Wherever the American goes in Europe it is with a feeling of satisfaction that he finds in the more important

cities the adaptation of our ideas for fighting fire. Our steam fire engines, our brass poles that bring men down from the upper stories of their station houses, our hinged collars that snap around the horses' necks at a touch are everywhere. At every important international exhibition of recent years, beginning even with that of Paris in 1867, American fire engines and ladder trucks have taken prizes.

At the Paris exposition of two years ago an American fire team from Kansas City, fourteen men under Chief George C. Hale, carried off all the most fire congress, at which were represented America, France, Portugal, Holland, Norway, Belgium, Switzerland, Denmark, Italy, Germany, Turkey, England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, New Zealand, India, Austria, Mexico and in the competitions. The first contest gines competed. The test was made from cold water in the boiler. The average time for foreign engines in getting a stream from the hose was from eight to twelve minutes. Their streams reached about half way across the river. In five minutes and thirty seconds the American engine threw a stream that wet people on the opposite bank, a distance of 310 feet. The size of the stream was nearly double that thrown by the other engines.—Philip

Such, however, is not the case by any means. This new catash mother is much more careful and modern, for she makes the father care for the eggs and young. She drops the eggs around anywhere, while the poor father, swimming after her and gobbling the eggs up in his mouth, must carry them for some weeks before they hatch. He can eat nothing during this time and so grows thin and lean and

"In this new catfish the male alone has the big jaws and mouth. He is litle more than a foot long, but the jaws and mouth are enormous, for in his mouth he must carry about twenty or thirty eggs, which are nearly an inch in diameter, larger

The Lion of Lucerne. A great deal of anxiety is felt in the country through the discovery that one of Switzerland's chief historical monuments, the Lion of Lucerne, is threatened with destruction The lion, which was chiseled from the solid sandstone rock by Thorwaldsen in 1792, commemorates the massacre of the Swiss guard during the French revolution, and as a work of art is unique.

It is situated in rather damp su roundings, above a pool in the glacier garden at Lucerne, and the water has trickled through the sandstone, which threatens to crumble and thus destroy the statue. An expert has been examining the rock, and by his advice it has been decided to cut away the surrounding rock and isolate the lion.-Genera Cor. London Chronicle.

TIDINESS ABOUT THE FARM.

From an English Journalist You May Make Valuable.

party of English journalists reently traveled through Canada, seeing much of the country and taking note of all they saw. They were all en of wide experience trained observe cl. sely and to criticise frankand fairly. In Canada they saw auch that aroused their wonder and alled forth their warmest praise. Beore they came they knew the extent of our country as expressed in figares, now they realize what those fig ures mean for they have journeyed across the land when the harvest was being gathered and with their own eyes have seen evidences of the coun try's greatness and fertility. Having eturned home they are now telling the British public about the forests and the wheat fields, the meadows and the orchards, the farms, the villages and the towns of Canada. Mingled with their descriptions and their praise is some criticism advice which is worth at least, the attention of our people.

In the course of an interview given by the leader of the party, just before they set sail from Canada, suggestion was made that our counimportant honors at the international try people should pay a little more attention to the appearance of their homes and their surroundings. Crime in London.

Rarely does any official report contain such depressing matter as that on prisons just issued from the home office. It formally records that during last year the number of people n prison increased by between 17, 000 and 18,000, as compared with the previous year. In London criminality has so largely increased that between 3,000 and 4,000 prisoners of both sexes have to be transferred to provincial jails for lack of ade quate accommodation in the metropolis. Nor us this terrible growth of lawlessness of an abnormal character, it appears to have acquired nor-mality, judging from the fact that the number of London commitments increased from 38,373 in 1891 to 58,591 in 1901. During the whole of this period, and long before, our highly improved and extremely cost ly educational machinery was in full operation as a corrective of criminal instincts, but, so far as can be seen, it appears to have rather acted as a stimulant. One thing is quite clear at all events-the exisiting system of punishment does not produce that deterrent influence among persons predisposed to crime which was hop-
