HOW BRITAIN COULD FAVOR HER

COLONIES.

The opponents of inter-Imperial pre ferential trade pretend to assume that it would mean increased taxation for the British people. As a matter of fact, it would merely mean a readjustment of taxation. It must not be supposed that the United Kingdom has no customs tariff. Last year £21,-845,436, equal to over \$106,300,000, was collected from customs duties. Among the articles upon which customs duties are paid are fea, coffee, chicory, cocoa, chocolate, currants, figs, plums (dried or preserved), prunes, raisins, spirits, beer, wine, tobacco and snuff. The radical difference between the British tariff and the Canadian and American tariffs is that the United Kingdom selects for customs taxation chiefly those articles which cannot be produced at home, while the aim of protectionists in Canada and the United States has always been to admit free of duty or at a very low duty all articles which cannot be produced at home. For instance, tea and coffee cannot be produced in either

Canada or the British Isles. British Government imposes heavy duties on tea and coffee, but these articles have been admitted to Canada free of duty ever since the protective tariff was adopted. The British government last year collected £4,030,259 -that is nearly \$20,000,000-in duties on tea. Suppose that the tax were removed from all-tea produced within the British Empire. Nearly all the tea now consumed in the United Kingdom is produced in Ceylon and Brit ish India. Out of a total importation of 201,716,686 lbs. last year, all but 14,-166,854 lbs. were grown in British possessions. It is probable that the removal of the tax on teas grown within the Empire would immediately cause importations of foreign teas to almost entirely cease. The duties on coffee, cocoa, chocolate and chicory amounted last year to £419,696. 'All of these articles could be produced entirely within the Empire, and would be if no duties were chargad upon them when grown in British posses-

sions.

Thus, by abolishing the duties on tea, coffee, chocolate, cocoa and chicary, when grown within the Empire the British people would be relieved of £4,449,955 of taxation. Now the total value of all the wheat, barley, oats beef, mutton, bacon, butter, cheese poul try and game, eggs, apples and potatoes imported into the United Kingdom last year was £86,486,887. If an ad valorem duty of five per cent. had been placed on all these articles where imported, whether from the colonies or from foreign countries, the total taxation would amount to only £4,324,344, less than the taxation taken off tea, coffee, chocolate, cocoa and chicory. If the products of the Empire were exempt from the tax, being thus given a preference over those of foreign interest to the business men of this countries, the total taxation paid by the people of the United Kingdom would be less than what is now paid on tea alone. There is scarcely a family in the United Kingdom that does not use tea. To take the tax off tea, coffee, chocolate and cocoa when grown within the Empire and distribute it over the food products imported from foreign countries, would not hurt the people of the United Kingdom, and it would mean great things for Canada. It would that almost everything produced on a Canadian farm would bring five per cent more to the farmer than if it were produced on a farm in the United States. There would be a rush of settlers to the vacant lands of Canada and every Canadian industry would be benefitted by the growth of population.

Is not that worth trying for? Why should not the two Canadian political parties unite to bring it about? This should not be made a party question. Liberals and Conservatives should unite to carry it to a successful issue. Our government should earnestly request it and ask the Australian colonies to join in pressing the matter upon the attention of the British government. And it is not likely that the request would be refused.

If the British government wished to go further and give the colonies a sten per cent. preference on all their food products; by imposing a ten per cent duty on food imported from foreign countries, they could do so by cutting down their present duties on tobacco by one half. The customs duties on tobacco imported into the United Kingdom last year amounted to £11,012,927, or nearly \$55,000,000.

I There are a great variety of other. ways in which taxation could be readjusted in the United Kimgdom, if the British government wished to increas the protection of the farmers and manufacturers of the Empire. Every man who has a gun must pay a tax under the present system; a tax must be paid on every carriage; stamps must be placed on receipts, drafts, bills of exchange, deeds and other contracts. In fact almost every business transaction in the United Kingdom is taxed to carry on the national government.
