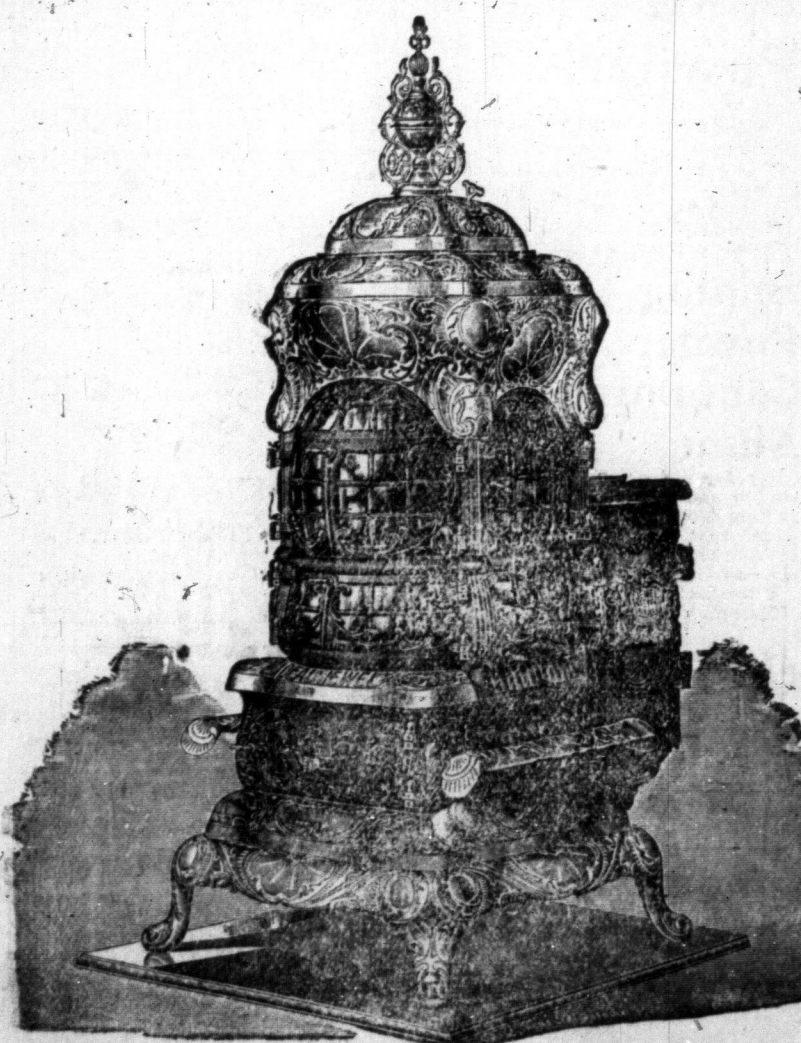

That your committee together with the city clerk and Superintendent Jones met Messrs. Smith and Laurie, of the Bell Telephone Co., in the office of Mr. Kerr, in the absence of Mr. Wilson, on the 19th inst., when it was arranged that our fire alarm system can be extended to the full requirements of the city by asking tenders from the Bell Telephone Company through Mr. Laurie, their agent here, for the construction thereof or any part thereof and that the said Bell Telephone Co. will do the work at about the same rate as they did the original work, but it must be done by their men to avoid trouble in placing the wires on the upper cross arms of the company's poles. The report was adopted.

A MUCH WANTED LIGHT.

Ald. Sulman asked what was going to be done concerning a light on the corner of St. George Street and the railroad.

Ald. Fleming said the property committee proposed to wait until spring, owing to the overtaxed dynamo circuits.

Ald. McCoig said he did not think St. George street was being fairly treated.

Ald. McKenough said that the constant complaint of overtaxed dynamo should lead to a looking into the whole system.

Ald. Liddy asked if the filling on La-croix street was being done under the frontage system or the general fund.

SAW BOY'S SPIRIT

Mrs. Matthew's Very Strange Experience.

Shortly After Seeing the Apparition News of the Child's Death Arrives.

In connection with the phenomenon of the luminous pork at the residence of "Babe" Matthews in North Chatham there is another story of a somewhat weird character.

Mr. Matthews' little cripple son was at the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto and died there. No news of his death, however, had arrived at the time of the following occurrence as told to the Planet by Mrs. Matthews:

"I had gone out into the summer kitchen for some salt," said Mrs. Matthews, "and I felt the child tugging at my dress. The poor little boy had no strength in his thin hands and before he was sent to Toronto, he had a habit of pulling at my dress thinking this great fun. When I felt the familiar pull, while getting the salt, I looked around but could see nothing. I again turned to the salt and again felt a tug at my dress and again on turning I could see nothing; I had secured what I wanted and was leaving the kitchen when I happened to look up and saw the child standing in the coal box. All I could see was about half his body from the head down. I was over- come by the sight and going into the house told my mother that I must be getting out of my wits. A short time afterwards the telegram arrived from Toronto announcing his death."

Asked as to the appearance of the child's face on the pork, Mrs. Matthews said that it was quite distinct and could be easily seen. She was sorry that Joseph Guttridge had called and taken away the quarter of luminous pork for shipment to Toronto for analysis, otherwise The Planet representative could have had a look at the face in the meat. Mrs. Matthews seemed to regret the loss of the pork as visitors had ceased coming and she was lonesome. According to Mrs. Matthews some 500 people had visited the house.
