ENGLAND'S PERMISSION

Granted To Enable 150 Men Of R. G. A. To Enlist In R. C. A.

BOWLERS WIN HEARTS

London, Dec. 3.—(C.A.P.)—The Canadian Government's application that 150 men of the Royal Garrison Artillery be allowed to enlist in the R.C.A. has been granted.

It is understood the request that the 63rd Regiment C. M. be allied with the King's Royal Rifles has reached the King.

Early Christians In B. C.

J. H. Turner, agent general of British Columbia, writes The Telegraph with reference to the statement alleged to have been made by Bishop Ridley of Torquay that when he arrived in British Columbia in 1879 "he did not find a single Christian." Mr. Turner says it seems impossible that the bishop could have made such a statement, as there was then a white population of 60,000, including bishops, priests and clergymen of all denominations. As to Bishop Ridley's residence in Yorkshire having fitted him for savagery in British Columbia, Mr. Turner leaves it to Yorkshiremen to reply.

The Scotlan says Canada's rush toward the front in the race of commerce and national well-being is one of the outstanding features in the history of the British Empire world, and points to the danger of British refusing to reciprocate preferential advances.

Winners of Hearts.

The Scotch bowling team which visited Canada were entertained at dinner by the Scottish Bowling Association of Glasgow. President England said the team could not have been better entertained than by the Canadians, whose patriotism was unbounded. Ex-President Morrison, proposing the Canadian Bowling Association, said although the Canadians did not win many games, they won many hearts. "The Maple Leaf" was sung, and the hope expressed that the Canadians would return the visit.

Lord Strathcona entertained at dinner the Athenaeum representatives of the London Chamber of Commerce, whom Lord Elgin presented with a silver vase from the C.M.A. as a souvenir of the latter's visit in 1905.

CONVICTS C. M. HAYS.

General Manager of the G.T.R. Held For Breach of Two-Cent Fare and Third-Class Carriage Act.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—Having heard the evidence put in by Mr. J. Walter Curry, K.C., acting for the Crown, on Saturday Magistrate Denison considered the case of the complainant proved, and confirmed his convictions against Charles M. Hays, general manager for the company, on having violated sec. 3, chap. 37, of 16 Victoria, in having omitted "to do that which said section required to be done, to wit, to carry third-class passengers for the fare or charge of one penny for each mile traveled, and to provide that at least one train having at least one third-class carriage, shall run every day throughout the length of the line, contrary to the provisions of sec. 138 of the criminal code," and the stated case will now be submitted to the High Court to determine the magistrate's jurisdiction as to the right to impose sentence, the same to be deferred until the stated case is returned.

A Citizen's Rights.

The principle which governs the prosecution is that in the enforcement of a public right, and one in which the whole people are concerned, it is within the province of any citizen, whether he desires to travel or not, and even if he individually has received no injury thereby, to come to the criminal court and ask "justice be done in the premises," if a charter or section of a charter is being violated to the injury of the public at large and the development of the country. On the other hand, the line of defence adopted by Mr. Hays' counsel is, that by legislation known as the Special Railway Act, the Grand Trunk Co. can not be compelled to have anything beyond a minimum and maximum tariff, and are not obliged to have third-class carriages.

Provides For Fine.

This act, quoted by Mr. Nesbitt, at first hearing of the case, and on which they rely, provides damages only—not less than \$10 nor greater than \$5,000, for individuals claiming injuries sustained through the omission or negligence of the company's officials or employees.

Voigt Sentenced.

Berlin, Dec. 3.—The trial began yesterday of Wilhelm Voigt, rendered famous in Germany as "Captain Von Coepenick," owing to his bold robbery of the treasury of Coepenick and the arrest of the burgomaster of that town, Oct. 16, with the assistance of a number of soldiers who had been imposed upon by Voigt. Voigt was sentenced to four years' imprisonment and costs.

May Be Grigg's Slayer.

Montreal, Dec. 3.—A colored man, who gave his name as Geo. Munroe, was caught and held at Cote St. Luc on Saturday night on suspicion of being the author of the Grigg outrage.
