Boston Murderer Believed to Have Fled to Canada.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 25.-John Ham mond, the missing husband of the wo-man whose strangled and decomposed body was found here Thursday wedged in a trunk in their home, is said by the police to have confessed more than a week ago to his brother-in-law a Cohoes man named Magini, that he had killed his wife.
