THE OLD AND THE NEW.

The period of stock-taking and good resolutions is here once more. Despite the flippancy with which most of us speak of the associations of the season of New Year it is not without an aspect of seriousness not wholly disregarded. As the child whose copy book has been disfigured by clumsily constructed pothooks and blotches of ink spilled by an unskilled pen, delights to turn over a new leaf; so older people, conscious not only of unfulfilled good intentions but also of many sins of commission less excusable, like to cheat themselves for a moment with the belief that a new year will be marked by an appreciable advance. For most of us it is the clean sheet in the book in which the record of our successes and failures in the task of life are automatically inscribed. At the bottom of our hearts there is the premonition that when the last line of the new page has been reached the aspect of the whole will show little improvement on the previous one, which we so gladly hid from view. In our serious moments we know that the task is too difficult to allow of sudden and successful leaps towards perfection. It is in the nature of things that progress of this sort, so far from being spectacular, should be at best barely perceptible.

Despite all these considerations, however, the clean sheet has its attractions and it is well that it should be so. Despite the proverbial wisdom which declares that good intentions go to pave the floor of the most unholy of places, we venture to assert the truth that should be trite, namely, that good intentions are good. After all, there is this truth in the proverbial reference to their purpose, that they provides footbold for those who have failed afford ing, too the only certain foothold to those who would move uphill along the path of moral effort. If they go to pave the floor of hell, they provide also the only spring-board from which one may take a leap into cooler, calmer and more pleasant surround-

MANNING THE SHIPS.

Those who have little faith in the ability of the people of the Dominion to build, man and maintain a Canadian navy, have made much of the fact that there has been no rush of recruits to the Canadian navy and that desertions during the past year have been frequent. Canadians cannot be induced to volunteer for service, we are told. If Canada sent out a call for men to man her ships there would be no response. Hence the only course open to the Dominion in dealing with the naval question is to sing "Rule Britannia," buy a dreadnought or two and let the Britishers do the fighting.

An effective answer to those who, while loud in professions of patriotism, gloat over the scarcity of recruits for the Canadian navy, is contained in the recent report of Admiral Kingsmill. The following

"Owing to the uncertainty of the future naval policy, and to the accommodation being limited, no special efforts have been made to obtain recruits."

Admiral Kingsmill does not add that, in any case, an appeal for recruits would have been made under most unfavorable circumstances while "loyal" Tories were engaged in jeering at the men as mock sailors and scoffing at the ships as units in a "tin pot navy."

Of the desertions which have been made much of by those who are strangely anxious to ridicule any serous effort on the part of Canada to take an effective part in the defence of the Empire, consistent with the dignity and self-respect of an autonomous people, Admiral Kingsmill says:

"The large number of desertions is attributed to the fact that the larger number of recruits are drawn from cities and towns remote from the sea; candidates present themselves who are totally unacquainted with the conditions of life on a ship, which differs much from that with which they are accustomed.

"Up to the present time the fishing population has not been exploited, and it is anticipated that recruits can be obtained therefrom who are inured to a sea life and who would find themselves in con-

genial surroundings in a man o' war." There can be no doubt in the mind of any thoughtful person that the material for manning a navy can be obtained as readily in Canada as elsewhere. In this connection it will be well to remember that Canada has on her coasts at the present time fishermen to the number of 70,000.

It will be useless, of course, to blink the fact that In this connection it will be well to remember that if men are to be induced to volunteer the life must be made sufficiently attractive. While many are prepared to volunteer for service at a time of crisis men cannot be expected to enter the army or navy as a life work if the service offers salaries smaller than those offered in any other calling. That would involve a sacrifice which this or any other country has not the right to ask of any of its citi-

Canada has the material to man a navy and she has the will to do it. Mr. Borden and his associates will oppose her at the peril of their political lives.

The year 1912 was one of the most inadequate heated years of recent times. The thermometer remained persistently at zero until March. Over 1,000 theatrical companies were frost-bitten before June. Wood fires were comfortable in July and in November the greatest snow in the history of America fell, completely burying the largest president and the most terrific ex-president the country has ever known.

The year 1912 saw great progress in many ways. Aviators, office buildings, the price of gasoline and the cost of living reached hitherto untouched altitudes and automobiles became so cheap that no man with \$500 will be safe henceforth.
