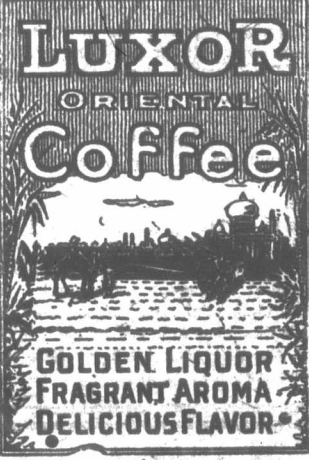

CORMIER IS MAYOR; TWO NEW ALDERMEN

Friday evening last was nomination day and Tuesday was election day for the Mayor and Town Council. There was a contest in only one ward, Ward 2. The candidates in that ward being J. Frank Rice, T. Medley Richards, Jr. and Aurele Hermite. The poll closed at four o'clock in the afternoon and when counted the vote stood as follows:

T. Medley Richards, Jr.	320
J. Frank Rice	296
Aurele Hermite	81

The first two were declared elected. The new Council consists of the following: Max D. Cormier, Mayor, elected by acclamation.

Aldermen Ward 2—J. Alme Michaud*, Elsieur Ouellet*.

Aldermen Ward 3—J. Frank Rice, T. Medley Richards, Jr.

Aldermen Ward 4—N. P. Legere*, Romuald Nadeau*.

* Those marked with an asterisk were elected by acclamation.

There are three of the old council elected to serve this year—Elsieur Ouellet of Ward 2, N. P. Legere of Ward 4, and J. Frank Rice of Ward 2. The voting was brisk throughout the day, a number of carriages and automobiles being used in bringing the voters to the poll.

The two successful candidates, who were elected on Tuesday, received a great many congratulations, especially Mr. Rice, who is a veteran councillor, a popular business man of the town almost since its inception, interested in everything to forward the progress of the town, and at present President of the Edmundston Driving Association.

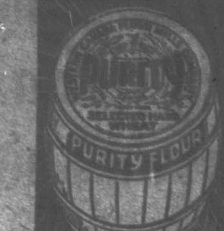
