BRITANNIA RULES WAVES. New York Paper on British Naval Manoeuvres. Shows Increase Since Display at Coronation of King Edward. Greatest and Most Up to Date Navy Ever Assembled. Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

We urge that on no account should sponges be used under these hats, for the minutes the water is absorbed the sponge serves to make the head hotter instead of cooler. In hot weather horses should be allowed to drink four times a day. It is also well to sponge off their heads, ears, nostrils and necks with cold water at the same time.
