ADDRESS IN ANSWER TO HIS EXCEL-LENCY'S SPEECH.

LENCY'S SPEECH.

The Hon. Mr. Ricz moved that the order of the day be now entered into; and it having been read by the Clerk; his Honor next moved that the Address as prepared by the Committee appointed for that purpose be now read a 2d time—And this having also been done, he then moved that the House do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to take it into consideration.

The Hon. Mr. Swarer.—I beg to second the motion of my hon. friend. As there are certain topics and peculiarities noticed in the Speech delivered by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the Session,

For whatever be the consequences to myself. For whatever he consequences to myself. The whatever be the consequences of the second Sintute that was jeased some years ago relative to Members of Assembly accepting offices of Emolument, shewed the wisdom of the Imperial Parliament in recommending our adoption of such an Act because under it such parties were placed upon their trial as it were when they were sent back to their Constituencies for their approval or rejection—this is the safe guard the constitution provides, and it had been found a sufficient one and fully adequate to defend the people's rights, for no man obnoxious to them can thereby be placed in office. There is one other point to which I wish to call your Honors' attention and which I think is very properly noticed in the Speech, and that is as to the right of members of the Legislative Council holding offices of emolument. The idea entertained by some people that we are ineligible' is not only in my estimation a very absurd one but we should view it as an unjustifiable and unconstitutional invasion of our just rights. But I cannot insult the good sense of the house by saying more on this subject. And with respect to that part of the Speech where his Excellency notices the rapid and marked improvement of the Country, during the last 3 years while under Responsible Government, from the situation of the Island and our much increased intercourse with neighbouring Provinces, he sees nothing, nor do I Sir, why there should be any thing like a departure from the present system. So prosperous and happy a state of things indisputably proves that the Country has improved during the period named by his Recellency and in approving it he only adventes the principles he was sent out here by Her Majesty the Queen to establish; and therefore I sak why should we be tinkering a new Constitution we know nothing about, and of which we have had no evidence whatever as to its effects. Let us look to the improvements which have been effected in the trade of the Country and to the increased demand and

remunerating prices our farmers now receive for the produce of the soil. Does any thing, I ask, call for such a change as is now sought for. I say emphatically no, and I anticipate the general, if not entire concurrence of this House. I repeat, I was a long time a Member of the Government, and I think we may challenge the world in respect to our Legislation. I now turn your Honor's attention to that part of the Speech referring to the Education Bill. There are already 200 schools registered under that Act. Every body knows that it is yet, as it were, only in transite and the only patent defect we have as yet descovered is that we cannot find a sufficient number of properly qualified persons to superintend these schools. The person appointed as School Inspector is one who has been highly recommended as well qualified to fill the situation—He comes from what may perhaps be termed a normal school instituted for the express purpose of filling such situations as the one he now holds, and I have no doubt the country will ere long derive much benefit from his services. I pass over that part of the Speech addressed particularly to the other branch of the Legislature. I now touch upon the assertion, that questions which long agituted the public mind have been settled amongst these the most prominent is escheat. Well, then, I say is it not somewhat singular, that such a question should have been slenced under the administration of the responsible party, some of whom too, have been accused of holding opinions favorable to such a measure? Whatever, might be the opinions of such, and I never heard them utter one that favoured any such idea, it is strange indeed that that subject should have become a dead letter, and have been deemed an unpracticable one while they held office. His Excellency next proceeds to the question of the Fishery Reserves question at last—in no other way can it possibly be disposed of. Hydra headed objections in rapid succession will no doubt be started up and brought to bear against the Principles of

from our sanctioning or countenancing any assertion of the kind, I think we should do all in our power to prevent the possibility of any collision between the respective branches of the Legislature. There is no necessity that the paragraph in question should be extended, and I submit that the reasons I have assigned are quite sufficient for striking it out. If it had been introduced in a Bill sont up from the other end of the Building, I certainly would not have shrunk from expressing an opinion upon it; but, however scalous I may be for preserving intact all the just rights of this Board, I should ever, I hope, guardedly abstain from doing aught that would have the remotent tendency to encroach on the rights of others. I therefore move that that part of the clause be struck out. The Hon. Mr. Macdonald.—Concurring in the sentiments expressed by his Honor, I beg to second his motion.

The Hon. the ATTORING GENERAL.—I certainly differ from the opinion expressed by the hon. mover (Mr. Holl), nor do I at all view it in the light of an interference with the rights or privileges of the House of Assembly. If we have the power to give an opinion and legislate upon a matter when it is embodied in a Bill, what can there be to prevent us taking it up when it comes before us in the shape of an Address, or in any other way! An argument that avowedly would not awail if we were considering a Bill, ought not to be brought to bear in the present instance. As regards the collision his Honor seems to apprehend, he may, I think, at once dismiss it from his mind as altogether groundless.
