THE LIGHT AT THE BOTTOM OF THE SEA.—An ingenious plan is said to have been adopted by Professor Agassiz's expedition for determining how far the submarine regions are pervious to light. A plate prepared for photographic purposes is enclosed in a case so contrived as to be covered by a revolving lid in the space of forty minutes. The apparatus is sunk to the required depth, and at the expiration of the period stated is drawn up and developed in the ordinary way. It is stated that evidence has been obtained of the operation of the actinic rays at much greater depths than hitherto supposed possible. The process might probably be useful in discovering the locality and state of sunken vessels.

REMARKABLE INVENTION.—The "New Haven Palladium" says:—"Mr. H. Bushnell, of this city, has invented a machine which, it is said, Mr. Thurston, the celebrated patent lawyer of Providence, calls the most remarkable he has ever seen. It is the result of years of thought, and is made to utilise the power which there is in the ebb and flow of the tide. It is so made that, whether the tide rushes in or out, a wheel will turn the invention, consisting in preserving a constant motion of the wheel. This power will be used to pump air into a large cistern, from which pipes will extend over a city, the compressed air being used as a motive power. Mr. Bushnell intends to set up the first tide-wheel in the Puinnipiac river, where, he says, the tide rushes in and out with a force equal to about 7,000 horse power."

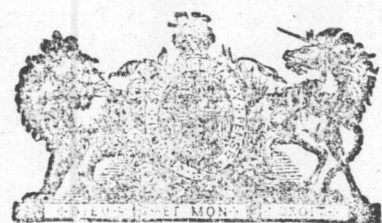

General Post Office Notice.

FROM and after the 1st day of November the Postage Rates on Letters, Books, Parcels, Circulars and Newspapers, addressed to the Dominion of Canada and Prince Edward Island will be as follows, viz.:

Letters, per half-ounce..... 6 cents.
Books and Parcels, per lb..... 16 "
Circulars, each..... 2 "
Newspapers, each..... 2 "
Prepayment compulsory.

A similar reduction will take place on the correspondence to and from the United States, when the Postal Convention has been signed, which will be about the first of December.

Correspondence transmitted by Contract Steamers leaving St. John's for Liverpool, will be, for Letters at the reduced rate of six cents per half-ounce. That per steamer via Pictou and Halifax to Liverpool, at the same charge as now made, of twelve cents the half-ounce.
