British Cabinet Has Another Crisis

Over Resignation of Sir Arthur Henderson and Attitude of Laboar Party

A London despatch on Monday says: With the press still filled with charges and counter charges relating to the action of the labor party in voting to participate in the Stockholm socialist Conference and Arthur Henderson's retirement from the cabinet, the situation was further complicated today by the French socialists voting to attend the Stockholm meeting.

The government has as yet taken no official stand as to the Stockholm meeting.

A wide division in labor ranks is apparent as matters now stand.

The Daily News declared today that as the government could not count on the support of labor, it would immediately ask the King to dissolve parliament and call a new election in view of the situation.
