of the protests of hon members of this House that award has been swallowed up in the general revenue. Last year there were some various appropriations for the various districts to the extent of \$1500 each. The allocation of \$1000 to each district out of the interest of that award would at present be more appreciated than in any former year, owing to the distress and poverty which it is impossible to meet or alleviate out of the regular special grant. The money interest accruing from the fishery award constituted a special fund sacred to special purposes. It ought not to be diverted from the channels through which it was intended to flow. The result of the present action of the present action of the Receiver General would be that a fund which should be kept apart for the purposes indicated will be swallowed up in the main stream of the general revenue. He would therefore move the resolution which affirmed the principle formerly adopted by the house, but leaving the power to the Legislature hereafter to determine in what particular manner the money shall be appropriated.

Mr Scott had much pleasure in seconding the motion, and he considered it ought to meet with the approval of the house.

Mr O'Mara had much pleasure in according his support to the course of action proposed by his hon and learned colleague.

Mr Greene regretted the action of the Government with regard to this matter. So far as the district of Ferryland was concerned, their grants would be entirely inadequate without their proportion of this sum.

Receiver General regretted that he could not concur with the view expressed by the preceding speakers. If the course proposed by the hon and learned member for St John's East (Mr Kent) were accepted, it would necessitate the increase of taxation. Neither the events of the past, nor the prospect of the future, could warrant them in the adoption of such a course without levying an additional and unpopular impost. Hon gentlemen on both sides of the house were opposed to any further taxation under present circumstances, and therefore he would not admit the expediency of the action proposed by hon gentlemen opposite.

Mr Little considered it bad policy on the part of the Receiver General to endeavor to absorb the interest on the Fishery Award, and treat it as an ordinary item of duty on merchandise. The Resolution was then put and lost.

WATER COMPANY BILL.

Hon Mr Winter said, with regard to the Water Company Bill that it was merely to supply a defect that appeared to exist in the Act respecting special appraisements. There is a clause in that Act allowing special appraisements between the terminal appraisements, on a such property as becomes subject to assessment during that interval. There is at the present time, a large number of houses that ought properly to be subject to the operation of that Act, and although there is a provision in it for an apportionment it does not provide for sufficient machinery to bring it into force.

The Bill was ordered to be read a second time to be committed to a committee of the whole house to-morrow.

Mr Parsons moved the second reading of the Bill relating to minor suits in the district courts. At the present time minor suits cannot sue summarily in the district courts, but must take the legal proceedings in the Supreme Court, entailing additional costs and subjecting them to considerable inconvenience. Minor suits always had the right now sought to be conferred until 1872 when the Act was, no doubt, unintentionally omitted from the consolidated statutes. Supposing a small debt of three or four poun being due to a minor he is obliged by the present law, to wait till the Supreme Court opens to take proceedings. This was a manifest hardship and the object of the proposed Bill was to remedy it.

Mr Greene seconded the Bill he thought the principle a good one.

Hon Mr Rorke opposed the Bill as he thought it was a piece of legislation for very exceptional purpose. It might be remembered that a measure of this sort was introduced here about two sessions back and that he then strenuously objected to the matter. Planters in many instances, when they find that their voyage is a poor one, make their sons, who are minors participate in the result of the voyage as shahemen. He would never deny justice to an individual minor who could not his wages, but at the same he could not support a measure which, in his opinion, would facilitate the practice of fraud amongst those engaged in the fishery or in any other undertaking.

Mr Greene said that the hon member for Carbonear seemed to forget that if a merchant issued supplies to a man on the strength of his sons who are minors being excluded from a participation in the results of a voyage, the minors are not entitled to any share. This Bill on the other side, minors a right to sue in the District Court, and saves them from much of the expense at present incident to legal proceedings. It was not for the benefit of legal gentlemen.

Mr Little did not see how the objection made by the hon member for Carbonear can hold. The principle of the bill has been recognized in this colony. It was to enable a minor, who entered upon a fishing voyage, to sue his master, in case he refused to pay wages, in his own name. Where there is no shipping paper the Bill places him in precisely the same position he was in before.

Hon Mr Winter had much pleasure in supporting this Bill. It simply asks to have a young man under the age of 21 placed in the same position with regard to certain legal rights as one above that age.

Mr Scott had much pleasure in according his support to the Bill. The principle of it was incorporated in our laws so far back as 1851 and in that we merely followed the practice of English Courts.

Hon Surveyor General would give the Bill before the chair his hearty support. As a matter of fact the section was accidentally omitted from the statutes when they were being consolidated.

Hon Mr Rorke wished it to be understood that he had no desire whatever to deprive any person of his wages, if he earned in the ordinary and legitimate way with the knowledge of the supplying merchant.

The Bill was then read a second time. Ordered to be submitted to a Committee of the whole on to-morrow.

Upon motion the Indemnity Bill was read a second time.

Mr Kent presented the following petitions, from Martin Ryan and others of Torbay, and from William Shea and others of Pouch Cove which were received and ordered to lie on the table.

Hon Mr Rorke gave notice that he will on to-morrow ask leave to bring in a Bill to repeal Sec. 1st, title 17, cap. 12 of consolidated Statutes in so far as the same relates to the coast of Labrador. The house then adjourned till half-past three o'clock to-morrow.

Pursuant to adjournment the House opened at half past three o'clock.

PETITIONS

Mr Nowlan presented a petition from Edmund Duff and others, of Holyrood, on subject of roads.

Mr Watson presented a petition from George Payne and others, Methodist of Heart's Content, for a grant of money to construct a road to the cemetery there.

Mr Parsons presented petitions from John McGrath and others, of Torbay, from William Pupper, John Malone Pk Malone and others of same settlement on the subject of roads.

Mr Kent presented a petition from Garret Coody of Torbay, praying for employment on the public works.

These several petitions were received and ordered to lie on the table of the house.

Mr Parsons presented petitions from several inhabitants of St John's East on the subject of roads, also a petition from E. Bay on the subject of the erection of a pump there.

On motion the house then went into Committee of the whole on the Supply Bill.

Mr Watson in the chair. Mr Parsons said it would be remembered that on last session he offered opposition to the main features of this measure. He felt that he must again oppose it; on several former occasions had advocated the abolition of the office of Governor. He found that the Governor of New York, governing four millions or more people than are contained in the whole Dominion of Canada, only receives for his services \$9,000, while our colonial governor was paid by the fishermen of this country a salary of \$12,000. He contended that the colony should not be liable for that sum, until the incumbent of this office was a colonial, and not an imperial appointment. Besides the salary of His Excellency, \$12,000, there were other incidental expenses, such as for a Private Secretary \$923, fuel and light \$2000; repairs to Government House \$500; and \$600 for a summer residence, amounting to an aggregate altogether disproportionate to the financial ability of this country. He trusted that at the expiration of His Excellency's term the Legislature will admit the advisability of abolishing this office.

On the vote for the maintenance of the Horse Police being proposed for adoption. Mr Parsons said that he was not here when the amount passed in committee upon supply, and if he were he should certainly strongly oppose this vote. The sooner we abolished that useless appendage the better.
