### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The British torpedo boat destroyer  
Deoxy sank off Solli Island on Saturday  
night the result of a collision with another  
destroyer. The crew were saved.

An Ottawa despatch says: The  
impression in political circles is that the  
tariff commission when appointed will  
consist of Messrs Fielding, Patterson,  
Sifton and Brodeur. No definite in-  
formation is obtainable.

Redemptorist Fathers from Boston  
opened a week's mission in St. Patrick's  
Church, Fort Augustus, on Sunday last.  
Missions will also be given by Fathers of  
the same congregation, at St. Teresa's, St.  
Andrew's and Traquair.

The train for the East was delayed for  
over an hour yesterday morning on ac-  
count of the engine of a working train  
having left the track. The engine in  
charge of R. McDonald left the city at  
6.40 and at the points near the Fitzroy  
St. crossing the accident occurred.

Dr. S. R. Jenkins left on Monday  
morning for Vancouver B. C. to attend the  
session of the Canadian Medical Associa-  
tion. He expects to be absent three weeks  
during which time Dr. R. J. Ledwell of  
Boston, who has been visiting Dr. Jenkins,  
will look after his practice. Dr.  
Houston of Seattle, Dr. McLaren of Mon-  
treal and Dr. Robertson of Ottawa are  
the other islanders physicians in attend-  
ance.

Halifax gave a royal welcome to Robert  
L. Borden Monday last night on his return  
from Ottawa. Thousands of people gath-  
ered at the railway station and along the  
route of the procession in his honor. It  
was a triumphal ovation for the Liberal  
Conservative leader. Halifax never in its  
history saw so great a political demon-  
stration; one so general in character, so  
spontaneous, and so enthusiastic. It was  
a popular outburst of appreciation which  
those who saw will remember long.

London advices of the 16th, say in  
compliance with a request received from  
the Government of Trinidad the Admiralty  
has instructed the cruiser Tribune to pro-  
ceed immediately to Venezuelan waters to  
protect British Stations and interests. It  
is understood that the request of the gov-  
ernment of Trinidad is based on reports  
showing that British employees of the  
Bermese Asphalt Co. are in danger in  
consequence of the attitude of the Venezu-  
ela government. Under his instructions  
Captain Spenser de Horsey commanding  
the Tribune will act in conjunction with  
the British minister at Caracas who is  
taking proceedings on behalf of the  
British employees of the company.

grand stand. These attractions will  
embrace, tight rope walking, and all  
manner of acrobatic performances, and

admission. The Exhibition of this year  
promises to eclipse anything of the kind  
previously held in this city, and no doubt  
the efforts of those in charge of the enter-  
prise will be rewarded by immense throngs  
of people every day of the Exhibition.

### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

The Dominion Parliament was pro-  
rogued on Wednesday afternoon last.

John Barrows, fifty years of age, while  
cleaning the windows of the Presbyterian  
Church, Montreal, the other day fell a  
distance of four stories to the pavement,  
knocking the upper part of his head  
completely off.

The Dominion government has been  
informed that the provincial government  
of British Columbia has entered action  
against salmon trap licenses issued by the  
Dominion, denying federal jurisdiction  
over the foreshore.

A very destructive fire raged in the  
woods and among fences in the vicinity of  
Village Green on Wednesday evening last.  
The united efforts of the neighborhood,  
prevented it from destroying buildings.

The reports come from Ottawa that the  
Government are going to install Marconi  
Stations on the Shores of this Province  
and the Mainland, and thus connect us by  
wireless telegraphy with the rest of the  
Dominion. We will believe that when we  
see it.

A young man named Winslow, formerly  
of Summerside, was drowned at Saugus,  
Mass., a few days ago. He and four  
others were in a boat on Lily Pond, when  
someone moved and the boat upset.

MAJOR BENNETT, Director of Contracts in  
the Militia Department, Ottawa is super-  
annuated. The vacancy is filled by the  
appointment of Harry Brown, formerly  
private secretary to Sir Frederick Borden.

A special from Salisbury, Mo., to  
Palo Alto, N. C. says information has been  
received at Darringer, that the gold mine  
located near Gold Hill, Rowan County,  
was suddenly flooded with water late  
Monday causing the instant death of  
eight men employed in the mine.

Rev. Dr. Moore, delivered his lecture  
on the nature, causes and prevention of  
consumption, to a good audience in the  
Kindergarten Hall on Friday evening  
last. The greatest preventative of  
tuberculosis are, cleanliness, wholesome  
food, an abundance of pure water, fresh  
air and exercise.

The Canadian yacht Noorra, success-  
fully defended the Seawanhaka Cup, by  
winning three out of five races. The fifth  
race was sailed on Wednesday in a  
moderate breeze and was won by Noorra  
in one hour, fifty-seven minutes and thirty-  
six seconds. She had the advantage of  
the White Bear by only two minutes and  
forty-four seconds.

LITIGATION which has been going on  
for some time among the Directors of the  
Canada Atlantic Plans Steamship Co., has  
been settled. President Hays and  
Director Gale have resigned from the  
Board of Directors, and at a meeting of  
Directors held here recently A. W. Perry  
was elected President and E. L. Wiers,  
Boston, Treasurer.

A son and heir to the Russian throne  
was born at St. Petersburg, on Friday  
last. Previous to the arrival of the newly  
born, the family of the Emperor consisted  
of four daughters aged nine, seven, five  
and three years, respectively; but the  
succession to the Russian throne runs in  
the male line only; consequently there is  
great rejoicing in the royal household on  
the birth of the heir to the throne.

A fire started in the Albion Iron Works,  
on Tuesday last week, at Victoria, B.  
C. which were partially destroyed. The  
flames spread along Government Street  
and across to the works of the estate,  
destroying forty residences, mostly of  
mechanics. A shift in the wind materially  
aided the flames. The flames were fi-  
nally extinguished, the total loss being  
\$200,000.

A mother and her four little children  
were killed and a number of others seri-  
ously injured in a collision on Wednesday  
last between the west bound Baltimore  
and a local passenger train, and a Chicago  
and Erie freight train at Brighton Park  
railway crossing, at Western Avenue and  
West Thirtieth Street, Chicago. They  
were a family of six and O. C. Schewaltz,  
the father was the only one who escaped  
with his life.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway  
Company was organized at Montreal  
Wednesday of last week the first meeting  
of the shareholders and directors at the  
Grand Trunk. C. M. Hays, general  
manager of the G. T. P., was elected  
president, and Frank W. Morse, third  
vice-president and general manager. The  
officers are: Wm. Wainwright, second vice-  
president; Henry Phillips, secretary;  
Frank Scott, treasurer; H. W. Walker,  
general auditor. Members of the execu-  
tive committee are C. M. Hays, Hon.  
George A. Cox, F. W. Morse, and W.  
Wainwright. The following are the di-  
rectors who were named: C. M. Hays, F.  
W. Morse, W. Wainwright, W. H. Biggar,  
Hugh A. Allan and E. B. Greenhalgh of  
Montreal; Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson,  
Lord Welby, Col. Fred Firebrace, Albert  
W. Smithers, and John Allan Clifton  
Brook, of London, Eng.; Hon. Geo. A. Cox,  
and E. R. Wood, of Toronto; John R.  
Booth, of Toronto; John Bell, of Belle-  
ville. Davidson and Wainwright, of Mon-  
trreal, were appointed local consulting  
counsel to the board.
