Canadian-West  
Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who was at the commencement of the present war, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after homesteaded land can rent and cultivate 60 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homesteaded patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homesteaded patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a horse worth \$300.00.

When Dominion Lands are being used or posted for entry, return a soldier who has served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agency Office (not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence credits under certain conditions.

### Legislative Assembly.

Prince Edward Island  
Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36. All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session or adjournment.

37. No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38. A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39. So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40. No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

### Example of Devout Christian Mother

On the Missouri and Pacific train out of Kansas City some time ago was a mother and four children—three girls and one boy. They had left Chicago the day before on their way to the Far West, where the husband and father had a claim, which was to be their new home. The eldest girl appeared to be about fourteen, and from that age they ranged down to the only boy, a chubby little fellow about five. Their dress and manners showed that they had not been reared in the midst of luxury; but withal they were modest children and scrupulously clean. The mother was thin, her face haggard from the worry of the long trip and the care of her precious little flock, for there were seven or eight long hours yet before the journey's end. It was after bedtime when the train left Kansas City, and the children were yawning and scarcely able to stay awake. In fact the boy, the pet of the family, had closed his eyes and was fast approaching "shut-eye town," while the next older tugged at him as she looked appealingly to her mother with an expression that was pitiful. He mustn't go to sleep yet, the others began whispering among themselves, and then the mother, regarding the curiosity of the other passengers, who sat in wonderment as they tried to divine the cause of so much whispering and strenuous effort to keep the little one awake, gathered her children around her. They occupied seats in the rear end of the car, holding a long seat which runs along the smoking compartment.

Presently the cause of all this excitement was made plain—it was bedtime and they had not said their prayers. Quietly, modestly, without ostentation or display, yes, even timidly, the mother and her children knelt together at the long seat. They made the sign of the cross and said their evening prayers. Just for a few minutes and then they arose; the children were made as comfortable as possible for the night, and soon all but the mother were asleep, while the traveling men with their grips, the business man with his worries, the women whose curiosity had been aroused, paid a silent tribute to the religion of all ages—the Catholic Religion.

that we were not traveling on passes, but the United States Government was paying our expenses. The food given us was terrible; in fact after a few days out the only things eatable were the cookies and sweets bought in the canteen. The stewards aboard went amongst us selling food, and they did a big business because we were half starved all the time. One day I bargained with a steward to bring me a roast chicken, for which I was to pay four dollars. Ten minutes later I saw him coming along the passage way with the chicken on the tray. I stepped into a side-gangway, and as he was about to pass I reached out my leg and tripped him, grabbed the chicken, hit him in the back of the ear and ran. Now the question I want to ask, chaplain, is this—was that stealing?"

The "question had so many ramifications that it is still unsolved. The struggle for existence is God's way of making the creatures make themselves. In our view of it, conscious life is worth all the cost of the struggle which went on before consciousness began to be. Moral life is also worth all the cost of all the suffering by which it has been obtained; but only on the condition that the gain is a permanent gain, and that there is no turning back of the shadow on the dial.

### Sacred Heart Will Reward Generous

The whole world is aware that millions of men, women and children in the northern provinces of China are dying of starvation. Appeals for the sufferers have been sent broadcast, and the United States Government has instituted relief committees whose duty it is to collect and distribute funds. Our missionaries are sending heartrending letters beseeching the aid of Catholics for the poor Christians that crowd at their doors begging for a few grains of rice to save them from perishing. Shall we deny their appeals?

Bishop Massi, O. F. M., of Central Shensi, China, says in regard to the dreadful conditions prevailing in his Vicariate, and for the relief of which he begs even the smallest alms:

"I have supreme confidence in the goodness of the American Catholics. If they could view with their own eyes the present distress of the inhabitants of North China they would see horrors that are beyond their wildest imagination. Truly the Sacred Heart will recompense those who come to the aid of a people He has seen fit to afflict so heavily."

A Catholic priest chaplain was sitting one Sunday afternoon in his billet in France, and his only company was a private soldier who sat quietly in a corner of the room smoking and dreaming of his Powder River ranch down in the southwest corner of Montana, for he was a cowboy. He was a good representative of that type of western phisician who was short on conversation but long on action. Suddenly the silence was broken and he requested the chaplain to elucidate the morality of stealing. This is the case for which he sought a solution, as he told it himself:
