The inside department was behind other years in fruit, grain and roots, a deficiency amply made up in the ladies' handicraft, it having been pronounced to be equal to if not to excel the ladies' department in the Northwestern fair. To sum up, the Exhibition on the whole was pronounced to be the best held at Dungannon for years.
