

## PRESIDENT WAITS FOR THE DEADLOCK

**Taft Will Have a Say When the Houses Come to Standstill on the Question of the Revision of Tariffs**

Washington, D.C., June 7—A practical plan is being devised between the White House and the Capitol whereby the senate and houses are to be brought into accord with President Taft on the question of the revision of the tariff. The Hearst news service is informed that this plan looks to the service of the president as referee or arbitrator between the senate and house when the tariff bill reaches the conference stage. On all the questions where the houses disagree and a deadlock results the matter in dispute will be submitted to the president and his decision will prevail.

This is in full keeping with the understanding which has become general in Washington that the real tariff bill will be made in conference and that it is at this stage that the president plans to have his ideas of revision downward carried out. The president, however, has not yet given his consent to this plan. A Republic
