Deceased who was about 67 years of age, was born in County Carlow, Ireland, and came to Canada when quite a young man Being a first class civil engineer he obtained employment with the C. P. R. Co. and worked for them for several years. He worked at Lachine with the late R. G. Reid, Esq., about 28 years ago and from that time up to the day of his death was associated with the Messrs. Reids and had the supervision of all their railway, bridge and station building. The depot in the West End of the city was planned by him and carried to completion un-der his direction and will remain as a splendid monument to his memory. He leaves a widow, two sons and four daughters at Montreal.

Mr. Massy left St. John's in 1910 for Montreal. He died of heart trouble. The Reid Nfld. Co.'s flags are all half mast to-day in sorrow for his demise. He was a most efficient and capable man, and it will not be easy to fill the position he occupied in the Reid Nfld.


