## Desserts.

## Anxiety Felt.

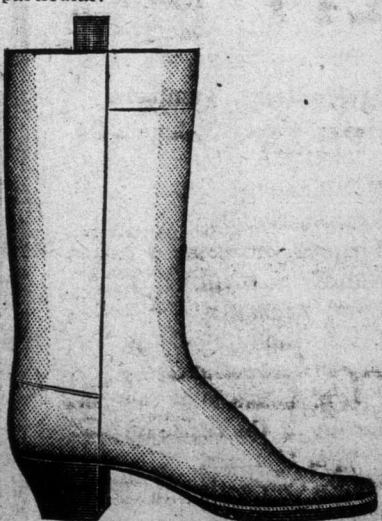
