Pessimism Prevails.

The tone of the despatches as to the outcome of the Home Rule Conference at Buckingham Palace is most pessimistic. How far that tone is justified by the attitude of the conflicting elements of the conference we have no means of judging. But if it is justified, it is a pity. Whatever is doing inside the Palace, it is clear enough that efforts are being made outside the Palace to make an agreement impossible. Apparently more concern is being displayed for party advantage than for national peace. There seems to be a section of the Unionist Party ready to risk a conflagration in Ireland in the hope of wresting a general election at which they believe they can win. What may take place in Ireland should they win and destroy the Home Rule Bill, does not seem to trouble them. On the other hand, there appears to be a band of labor men and radicals bent on harassing Asquith in the negotiations. Their attitude appears to be what they have called for must prevail, civil war or no civil war. After all, what is the difference between the parties? Carson in asking for the exclusion of Ulster as a whole, practically withdraws opposition to Home Rule for the rest of Ireland. Redmond in agreeing to a county referendum, admits the principle of exclusion to any county that wants it. Surely these positions are not irreconcilable, and they should not be incapable of adjustment. In this contention, the position of Redmond appears to be the more reasonable. As to the time limit, there appears to be little disposition on the part of the Government to insist on the six years' limit, and this question too should not be incapable of adjustment. Time does not appear to be of the essence of the exclusion. The exclusion is based on the refusal of the Ulster Unionists to be under a Dublin Parliament. As long as this refusal lasts, the exclusion must last. When the Ulster men see that it is to their advantage to come in, and the rest of Ireland wants them, provision

should be made for their inclusion. It will be up to the Nationalists to convert the Ulster Unionists by the success of the Dublin Parliament. We discount largely the effect of the defect of the Government in any Home Rule settlement the conference may recommend to Parliament. The fact of the matter is that so far as Parliament is concerned, the moderate men of all parties would put it through by big majorities and leave the dissidents in little better position than the majority of the Lords left the Die Hards last month. But the real difficulty is not at St. Stephen's, it is in Ireland. The settlement to be effective must be one which will prevent civil war in Ireland. It must be one that will reconcile the moderate Ulster Unionists and the Nationalists. That is the crux of the situation. It is not what will happen to the Asquith Government during the debate.

The Home arrived at Lewisporte at 4 p.m. yesterday.

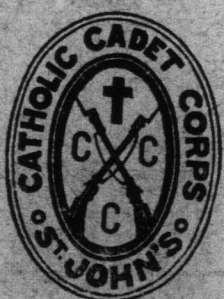
The Kyle is still anchored at Double Island awaiting an opportunity to proceed North.

Japan's Naval Scandal

Tokio, Japan, July 18.—Further sentences were pronounced to-day in the prosecutions of high officials on shipbuilding companies on charges of forging documents and bribing Japanese naval officers to influence the allotment of construction contracts.

Kenzo Iwahara, former manager in New York of the Mitsui Products Company, and retired Vice-Admiral Tsurutaro Memsuo, were each sentenced to two years' imprisonment, while Gichi Iida, managing director of the Mitsui Co., and Jotaro Jamarote, of the same concern, were sentenced to terms of eighteen months each. The sentence of Iida was, however suspended.
