#### Chief of German General Staff is Dying.

London, Oct. 23.—(12.10 a.m.) —A private letter received in Amsterdam from a high official in Berlin says Lieutenant-General Count Helmuth Von Moltke, Chief of the German General Staff, is dying, according to the Exchange Telegraph's Amsterdam

"Everything," the correspondent adds, "is being done to keep the news secret General Von Moltke is suf-fering from an affection of the liver. The cure he was undergoing was interrupted in July by the German mobilization. He has now had to leave Emperor William's headquarters, General Von Falkenhayn, the Prussian Minister of War being left in

charge.




