Newfoundland Can Raise Loans Without Trouble—Only Six Million Added to Public Debt—Communist Plot Responsible for South African Trouble—Manitoban Government Resigns.

BOLSHEVIK PLOT.
JOHANNESBURG, March 16. The police here have voluminous evidence showing that a Bolshevik plot was responsible for the revolutionary outbreak. The revelation will be "astounding," they assert. A government official declared to-night that the prisoners exceeded six thousand, and that those among them responsible for outrages would be dealt with. The railway men have resumed work.


NEWFOUNDLAND'S NEW LOAN.
TORONTO, March 17. A syndicate comprising the Dominion Securities Ltd., Toronto, Dillon Best and Co., New York, and Lee Higginson, of Boston, have acquired the six million bond issue of the Newfoundland Government, carrying five and a half per cent. for twenty years payable in New York funds. The price paid was \$8,768, the cost to the present colony being \$6.59 per cent. in New York basis. Figuring cost in Canadian dollars at four per cent. discount, the cost works out at about 5 1/2% and the price approximately 5 1/2%.

FRANCE WILL PAY HER DEBTS.
PARIS, March 17. Premier Poincaré told Finance Committee of Senate yesterday that France will pay all her debts as has been her custom.

A GOOD SIGN.
NEW YORK, March 17. The Bank of England, which has distributed a five per cent. dividend annually since 1914, has increased the rate to six per cent., a program to a financial agency here last to-day. The increased dividend was an agreeable surprise to international bankers. Even those with international London connections seemed to have no intimation that such action was impending. The larger disbursements coming so soon after reduction of discount rate was accepted here as proof of Great Britain's steady recovery to normal or pre-war conditions.

ADVANCING THE CLOCK.
LONDON, March 16. Summer time in Great Britain will begin March 26, and end October 8. An order to this effect has been issued to secure uniformity in time with France and Belgium.

GREAT EXCITEMENT.
ROME, March 16. Considerable excitement has been caused here by news that Greek warships had stopped and searched Italian steamships Umbria and Abazia, detaining the latter. The Messagero observes that Italy, notwithstanding the Græco-Turkish war, has never recognized the right of Greece to institute a blockade or to search ships, nor did France, who experienced a similar incident in the seizure of the steamship Espoir. The French steamship Espoir was released by Greece after a sharp protest from France. The Greeks, however, retained the cargo, which they maintained was contraband of war destined for the use of the Turkish Nationalist Army.

REPUTATED DE VALERA.
BOSTON, March 17. The leadership of De Valera was repudiated and his policy of external association with the British Empire was condemned in a resolution passed last night at a meeting of the Friends of Irish Freedom at their St. Patrick's Day dinner. Loyal support was pledged to the Provisional Government of Ireland under the leadership of Collins and Griffith.

REBEL LEADERS SUICIDED.
JOHANNESBURG, March 17. Joe Thompson, President of the augmented Executive of South African Industrial Federation, has been arrested in connection with the miners' strike. The rebel leaders Fisher and Spendiff, who were found dead in Trade's Hall at Fordsburg after bombardment of the city by Government forces, committed suicide, according to an official statement.

FIFTY CASUALTIES DURING RIOTING.
LONDON, March 17. Twenty natives were killed and thirty wounded at Nairobi, British East Africa, yesterday, in fighting which followed demonstrations over the arrest of the Indian agitator Tauku, says a Central News despatch.

BREAKING OUT AGAIN.
LONDON, March 17. The Labor Party to-day announced that Arthur Henderson had received telegrams from the Party's Russian foreign delegation alleging that the Soviet Government was preparing to renew its policy of terrorism against the Social Revolutionary Party. According to the telegram the leaders of the Russian Socialist Party, who have been imprisoned three years, will be tried for treason on March 20, and under cover of the trial the Communist Party intends to conceal its real purpose which is alleged to be to settle accounts with its political enemies. An appeal is made for immediate and resolute intervention on the part of Socialists throughout the world. Mr. Henderson has telegraphed Commun-

March is Month of Revolutions.

The "idea of March," which since the revolution seems to have had a disastrous effect, mentally, each year in certain circles in Germany, is again causing the Government and industrial controls no little anxiety. March is the month of revolutions, uprisings and revolts in Germany. Since 1918, Germany has been set by the ears every March. In March, 1919, there was a real attempt to overthrow the Government. In March, at the same time the Bolsheviks overthrew the Bavarian Government. In March, 1920, the Kapp-Lustwitz revolution chased the National Government out of Berlin. In March, 1921, there were radical uprisings in Middle Germany which took the Government a fortnight to put down. From confidential reports reaching the newspapers, industrial managements and the Commissioner of Public Security, it is declared that indications show that something is happening in extreme radical circles which fore-shadows some outbreak for this March.

The Terror of the Seas.

CRUEL MONSTER THAT IS EASILY COWED.

Many authors have written thrilling descriptions of the devil-fish, and although scientists declare that usually these accounts are exaggerated, they admit that the creature has many curious features.

The devil-fish varies in length from one inch to fifty feet, but very few specimens of the largest kind have been found, and none of these was in perfect condition owing to the fierce attacks of whales and other monsters of the deep.

They are provided with sucker arms or tentacles, with which they catch the small fish on which they live. These arms are tremendously strong, and, in addition, the devil-fish is armed with a sharp parrot-like beak. In spite of these formidable weapons, however, the creature, while cruel, are very timid—and easily cowed.

Amazing Speed.

The smaller devil-fish swim in shoals, and as they move they change their colour according to their surroundings. They have another device which enables them to escape when hard pressed. This is the ink bag, by means of which they can pour out a dark fluid which makes the sea around them thick and cloudy.

Even more extraordinary in their method of swimming. They draw water into their bodies and then force it out of a hole just below the head. The force of the water as it rushes out propels the creature. Usually, the devil-fish swims backwards, but it can swim forward simply by turning. Its flexible siphon in the opposite direction.

In appearance the devil-fish is a loathsome creature, for its long, writhing arms and fixed, stony stare are terrifying in the extreme.

Besides being able to swim, it can crawl along the sea bottom on its feelers. It lies in some crack in the rocks, and as soon as a fish passes its hiding place its feelers shoot out with amazing speed. Once the suckers have touched the victim there is no escape, and it is drawn quickly into the great mouth.
