In Ireland.

This is the great testing time for
the people of Ireland. For the first
time in centuries the control of Irish
affairs, both in North and South, is
virtually left entirely to Irish hands.
The test now is not a test of the Gov-
ernment and people of Great Britain
but of the Irish people. As the Right
Hon. Winston Churchill said the other
day in discussing the Irish situation
and the terrible bitterness towards
one another manifested by different
groups of the Irish people: "Will
they sink into a welter of anarchy and
strife or will they rise hopefully and
faithfully to a bright future of peace
and freedom which is within their
grasp? It is for them to decide. Their
fate is in their own hands. We can
help, we can hope, and we can cheer;
but it rests with them." And then
Mr. Churchill added these encouraging
words, encouraging because spoken by
a man whose position brings detailed,
authentic information as to events
and conditions in Ireland: "I vow
to you this afternoon, even in this
darkest hour, my very strong faith
and hope that things will come right."
Come right? Of course things are
likely to come right. The Irish have
shown such aptitude for politics in
other lands that it is almost incon-
ceivable that they will not overcome
in their own land even the great dif-
ficulties which now beset them. The
world will watch Ireland sympathet-
ically and hopefully.—Sydney Record

Animal Barometers.

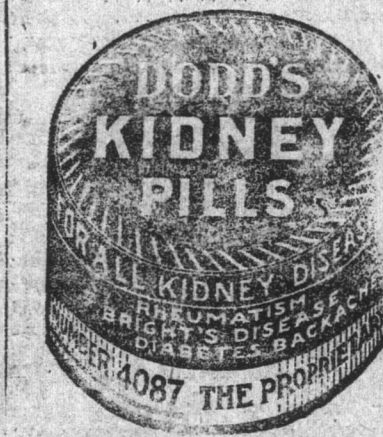
Among the recent arrivals at the
Zoological Gardens, Regent's Park,
London, are a number of interesting
fish from Denmark. They are known
as thunder fish because of their ac-
tions may be foretold the approach of
storms.

The thunder fish, in its natural state
lives in muddy brooks and lakes, bury-
ing itself in the mud. About twenty-
four hours before a storm these fish
come to the surface, and behave in a
most energetic manner. Their value
as weather prophets is so recognized
that they are often kept confined in
glass globes to act as barometers.

Another animal, a specimen of which
is also to be found at the Zoo, which
is believed to be a weather prophet,
is the European tree frog. In many
parts of Central Europe this frog is
kept in a glass jar, provided with a
ladder, which the animal ascends or
descends, according to the atmospheric
changes.

Paints Used by Ancients.

Paint is not a modern invention; in
deed white lead is of ancient origin.
The story is told of the wife of the
famous Greek General Xenophon, who
had the habit of smearing white lead
on her face and wearing high heels,



until her husband told her he thought
her pretty enough without the appli-
cation of artificial aids to beauty There
is a reference traced back as far as
the Seventh Century, A. D., which is
the first recorded instance of the use
of paint to cover a wooden carriage,
very much in the manner prevailed
today. There are earlier historical
mentions of the use of paint, but these
refer more to sizes, such as glue, and
special paints such as those made with
wax and used by the Romans in a mix-
ture with glue to paint their ships of
war. The Egyptians used glue sizes
and varnishes. The mummy cases in
museums indicate that clearly and
probably form the earliest examples of
varnished articles in existence.

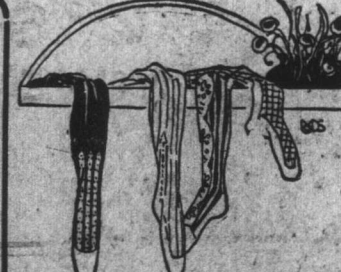

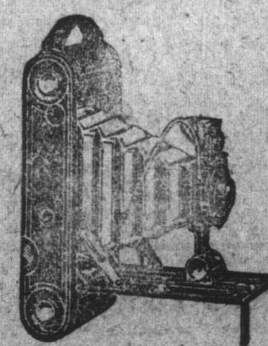
