

Out Sun a Star?

Accurate investigations carried on imultaneously in various parts of the world through a long series of years have demonstrated that the sun does not give out constantly the same amount of heat, but the variation is so great as to amount to 10 degrees words, our sun is a variable star. It has long been known that other stars vary in the amount of light they send forth, notably Mira in the constellartion of Cetus, but it required the most refined investigation with the most elobarate checks to prove that was the case with the sun. of the instruments is so delicate that it can measure one-millionth part of a degree of heat. It is found that the amount of heat

is connected with the spots on the sun, and, curiously enough, more spots more heat. Thus we have one factor in the changes of terrestrial temperature, although it is only one. Our seasons are caused by the inclination of the earth's equator to the ecliptic, and the heat is greater in summer when the sun's rays fall more directly on the earth. But as the amount of heat varies and as the radiation, reflection, etc., also vary, we have a very complex system of weather.

It is believed by the Smithsonian institution that eventually we shall be able, through knowledge on the subject, to make much more accurate weather predictions than at present and for a much longer time to advance.-Philadelphia Inquirer.
