### Nfld. Poultry Association.

The monthly meeting of the Nfld. Poultry Association was held in the Board of Trade Rooms last night. Arrangements were finalised for holding the tenth annual show in the Church Lads' Brigade Armoury on November 20 and 21, and December 1st. She shows will be officially opened at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, closing on Friday. Judge Landry who is a founder of the Association, is coming from the Canadian Government Agricultural College, Truro, to act as Judge this year, and will give a lantern exhibition each night at nine o'clock. The Railway Company will be asked to arrange the annual Shopping and Poultry Show Excursion during this week, thus bringing in our outport friends. A model poultry house twelve by twelve, after the designs and approval plans of the Association, is being built and will be disposed of at the show. The ladies of the Spencer Club will entertain the Judge and invite the members of the Bell Island Poultry Association to supper on Nov. 30th at the Armoury. The Association has presented a Silver Cup to be won outright at this year's show as a prize for the outport exhibitor winning the largest number of prizes on his birds. Special prizes will also be given and the Association hopes to make the tenth annual show a thorough success. Two new members were elected at last night's meeting. Sgt. Major Stewart Dewling and Mr. Fred White who will likely exhibit some birds at the November show. A Silver Cup as a prize for S. E. White Leghorns has been presented to the Association by Mr. Herbert M. Winter and will have to be won for three years before being finally won by the exhibitor.
