Breakfast; 9.00. Orderly Room; 9.15. Inspection of lines; 9.45 to 10.45. Company parades; 10.30. Inspection of Cook house and Mess tents; 11 to 12 noon. Battalion parades; 12.15. Bathing parade; 1 p.m. Dinner; 2 p.m. Guard mounting; 2.30 to 5 p.m. General leave; 5.30 p.m. Tea; 6 to 9 p.m. General leave; 7 p.m. Retreat; 9 p.m. Roll Call; 9.15. Prayers; 10.00. Lights out.

Orderly room is in charge of Corporal A. E. Whitten, who has also the care of the Camp Post Office. The cooking is excellent and in charge of Veterans Roberts and Harry Butler. One hundred and seventy slept under canvas Thursday night. 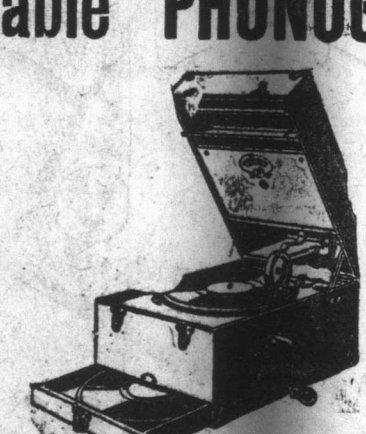
