

The Canadian Loan.
A despatch to the *Globe* from London on Saturday says that the Dominion Loan of four millions has been placed successfully by Mr. Cartwright on that market. The issue price is 90. Financiers agree that the outside price has been obtained and the operation is regarded as a good one.

The Herald's Revelations.
If the *Herald* has any one distinguishing feature, it is—always excepting its special mastery of every form of Billingsgate—an unconquerable love for notoriety. It lives, but does not seem to thrive, on sensations. Its attempt to startle the little world of Guelph by savage attacks on individuals, by gross charges against officials, and by promises of astounding revelations in connection with some of our institutions, have neither been few nor far between. But for most part its performances in this latter congenial work fall infinitely short of its promises. We had for instance on Saturday a great flourish of trumpets about some wonderful revelations it promised in regard to the Government inquiry which took place last week into the management of the Provincial Farm. Of course the innocent public, not knowing the tricks which the *Herald* is in the habit of resorting to, in order to keep it from being entirely lost sight of, expected a feast of fat things, but they were woefully disappointed, and we may add, disgusted, for after extracting all the complacent self-praise, the bounce and brag, from its long article, there were no revelations found to justify the promises made in its early announcements.

Now, it is shameful thus to delude the public, especially when the *Herald*—as it admits—had a "Special Investigator," who it seems was engaged in the very honourable work of caves-dropping, but whose long ears seem not even to have caught a particle of the evidence furnished to the Committee, though no doubt, he tried hard to do his best in this dispicable work of his master. In place of facts then, the editor and "Investigator," aforesaid had to resort to fancies in order to make up their barren programme to the public; and, among other wonderful revelations, informed them that the late Rector had sold for double their value to the Government an old pony and buggy. Now, the truth is that this pony and buggy were sold to the Principal—that they are his private property—and don't belong to the Government at all.

We don't intend to follow the *Herald* through its long rigmarole about this Institution, nor have we any desire or intention to conceal aught in connection with it which it is right that the public should know. But we consider it would be unfair to the parties most intimately concerned were we to comment on charges made, before we know whether or not they have been substantiated, or where the fault really lies. We stated more than a week ago that matters at the Farm were in a very unsatisfactory state. It was well known in town and its vicinity that there was not that harmony between the Principal and some of the heads of departments that was necessary for the success of the Institution—that there were rumours of mismanagement—and that some of the boys were very much dissatisfied with the treatment they received. These matters were very properly brought under the notice of the Government, and in the interest of all parties concerned, and especially of the Institution itself, an inquiry was asked and decided on. That inquiry took place on Monday and Tuesday of last week, and when we state that the Hon. Messrs. McKellar and Christie, Prof. McLellan, Inspector of Schools, and Mr. James Laird, Warden of the County, formed the Committee, our readers may feel assured that its investigation was exhaustive and impartial. The Government have the evidence taken now under consideration, and as soon as they arrive at a decision we shall make it known to the public. We are ignorant of the nature of the evidence given, and, as we said before, we consider it would be very unfair to comment on the subject until the action of the Committee and the Government is known. At the same time we have every confidence that they will pursue a course that is just and right, so as to ensure the success of the Institution.

We have said this much in explanation, not because of the sensational article in the *Herald*, but simply for the information of the public, and to show them that we have no desire to keep any facts from them that we know of. The Government have a plain duty to perform. The evidence is before them, and they will require to act on it promptly. The friends of the Institution, who have its prosperity at heart, expect this, and nothing short of energetic action will satisfy them.

As regards the *Herald's* charges against Mr. Clarke, the late Rector, that is a matter which it knows nothing about but by hearsay, and we fancy when the whole facts are known, they will assume much smaller dimensions than they do in the *Herald*. We have already knocked the bottom out of one of its charges against him. At the same time Mr. Clarke is no longer an

officer of the Institution, and for the present we have nothing to do with his conduct. He is also well able to answer for himself, if he considers the charges of the *Herald* worth taking any notice of.

THE MEMBER FOR HALTON.—The Conservatives of Halton did not at all relish Mr. Chisholm's speech at the Hornby picnic on Friday. After justifying the vote on the question of a prohibitory liquor law, he referred to the vast amount of work that had been accomplished under the leadership of Mr. Mackenzie, and eulogized that gentleman in the strongest terms. He justified his policy on the Pacific Railway and his action towards British Columbia. He dwelt long on the Reciprocity Treaty, and closed with a strong eulogium on Senator Brown. He referred to the action of the Premier in respect to the Oakville Harbour, saying there was no "red-tapeism" about Mr. Mackenzie, who was a gentleman in every respect. The different public acts introduced by the Government came in for great praise, and the manly and straightforward conduct of the present strong Government was favourably compared with the other weak and vacillating Administrations. It has not yet transpired what the Conservatives intend to do with their outspoken member, but we should think they cannot do less than ask him to resign. It will never do to have him praising Mr. Mackenzie and his Government in this fashion.

We are glad to learn from the *Hamilton Times* that Mr. J. H. Hunter, M. A., Principal of the Institution for the Blind at Brantford, is asked by High School Masters of Ontario to be the candidate for their representation in the reorganized Council of Public Instruction.
