A Word for the Cow.

The *Elmira Gazette* speaks a good word for the cow as an animal entitled to distinguished consideration, especially at the hands of industrious news-gatherers. It says:—"From the time that frisky member of her race leaped over the moon till to-day she has been the friend of the newspaper. It was the cow with crumpled horn that tossed the dog that worried the cat, that killed the rat that ate the malt that lay in the house that Jack built. And the philosophy of this simple yet touching occurrence has proved an inexhaustible source of illustration, sentiment and sarcasm. It was Mrs. Leary's old cow that kicked over the lamp that fired the barn that burnt the town that Chicago built. It was a cow that brought \$40,000 to Utica, and afterwards died like any other horned animal. But we have more specific reasons for paying this tribute to the bovine. When the Second National Bank of this city was the victim of industrious burglars, it was a milkman who discovered the hiding-place of the ingenious gentry. When the other day at early morn two wagon-loads of burglars came riding back to this city after their rollicking romp at Wellsboro, it was a milkman who discovered them and knew that mischief was afoot. And, last but not least, it was a man milking near Waverley who discovered Cosgrove go by with his pack-load of greenbacks, and who followed him to his capture. It is true, milkmen are not cows, but without cows there would be no milkmen. Hence our obligations to the female kine. CHEAP ICE HOUSES.—Set up posts in the ground two feet apart, and closely board them on the inside, so as to make an enclosure ten feet each way in the clear, with a door in one of the sides, with a roof, with a door in it on the north side. Pack in the ice in blocks as close together as possible, with an interval of half of a foot or more between the ice and the sides of the structure; fill this space with cut straw, saw dust, or tan, and ram it down well, with six inches depth of the same on the floor and a foot or more on the top. Structure and packing need not cost forty dollars. The floor or ground should be on an incline, so as to carry off any water rapidly. It is the air coming between the pieces of ice which causes it to melt rapidly, hence if water could be slowly introduced on an intensely cold night, the whole would be a solid block by the morning, and would last two years for one ordinary family. In some cases the crevices might be filled with pounded ice, on a very cold day, or with spare tan or cut straw. Take out the ice as quickly as possible, cover up the place, and shut the door. If ice has to be brought from a distance for the sick, it will keep a long time between two feather pillows; or if put in a stone jar, stand this on a pillow, lay another pillow around the jar and cover it with another, and keep the whole in a shady place.
