THE ACHING TOOTH

Toothache is generally an inflam atory condition, and in most cases there is a cavity in the tooth. When it is impossible to see a dentist at once, the treatment is simple. Apply a sedative and exclude the excretions of the mouth from the cavity. Prompt relief will follow.

A very effective agent, and one most always on hand, is oil of cloves. It should be applied by saturating a piece of cotton with the oil and then firmly placing the cotton in the cavity of the tooth with a toothpick or a small pointed instrument. That being done, fill the cavity little beeswax. The wax may be applied by warming it over a light on the point of a knife and while warm forcing it into the cavity.
