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BLACK KNOT.

Black knot is due to a fungus, and
the trouble is communicated from one
tree to another. If the disease is taken
in hand upon its first appearance, when
first seen breaking up through the bark,
and the branch removed, or, if the
branch is large, the affected portion
cut entirely away down to sound wood,
afterwards washing the wound with a
solution of chloride of lime (bleaching
powder), it can, if this is persisted in,
be subdued. Where the neighborhood
is filled with diseased trees it will be of
little use to try to cure your own, for
your neighbors' trees will continue to
infest them or any new ones that may
be planted. If all plum growers in the
vicinity would agree to cut down and
burn every diseased tree, and if the
healthy trees remain free from "knot"
for a couple of years, it may be safe to
plant new trees. The knot often at-
tacks the Morello cherry, and may ex-
ist in a locality where there are no plum
trees, and when these trees are planted
the cherries communicate the disease
to them. Thorough cutting, if it takes
the whole tree, is the only hope for the
present trees; if beyond this, cut down
all the diseased trees and do not plant
any more plums until the disease ap-
pears to be extirpated in the vicinity.
It has been stated that yellow plums
are less liable to the knot than those
with purple fruit, but this is not well
established. — American Agriculturist
for July.

COLUMN ARTICLE.

One of the most serious hindrances
in onion growing is the onion maggot,
the larva of a small fly resembling the
house fly, but smaller. No positive
remedy is known, but it is a common
belief among gardeners that when the
maggot becomes troublesome it is a
good plan to change the land, which
otherwise would not be done, for, un-
like cabbage and many other crops,
onions thrive year after year on the
same land.

It is always bad policy to crop bear-
ing orchards, and one reason for this is
that it generally prevents their pastur-
ing by pigs, which are the best scaveng-
ers for destroying wormy fruit, with
its contents. The apples in our mark-
ets would be fairer if pigs had the
range of apple orchards, and the pigs
themselves would be more healthful
food. If not ringed, pigs will give an
orchard all the ploughing it needs, with
no danger or injury to tree roots.

THE MONTREAL CONVENTION.

The Dominion Prohibition Convention,
to be held at Montreal on July 3rd, 4th
and 5th, will be a gathering of remark-
able interest. It will be the first national
Canadian conference of delegates from Prohibition-
ists. The great meeting in Montreal in
1875, out of which came the Dominion Al-
liance and the Scott Act, was simply a
mass convention of active temperance
workers. In the coming meeting every
delegate will represent a constituency of
Prohibitionists anxiously waiting the de-
cision of their leaders and the call to arms
for further conflict.

The convention has been called by the
Dominion Alliance, but it will be thorough-
ly independent when it meets, and will or-
ganize and control itself. Every local tem-
perance organization, every lodge, division,
council, union, club, church, society, or any
such institution is invited to send a dele-
gate for each fifty of its membership, any
number not being a complete fifty to count
as fifty for the purpose of representation. Every
Provincial Temperance organization is
invited to send its executive committee
or an equal number of representatives.

Every Provincial Branch of the Alliance is
to send ten, and every County Alliance or
Scott Act Association is entitled to five.

The principal railway and steamboat
lines are acting very liberally towards the
Convention. The Grand Trunk and Cana-
dian Pacific Railways and Richelieu Steam-
boat Company will issue return tickets to
Montreal, for single fare, to persons ap-
plying. Tickets will be issued on this plan
from Saturday, June 30th, up to Tuesday,
July 3rd, and will be good for return pas-
sage up to Saturday, July 7th. It will be
seen that all who attend the Convention
(which will be open to the public), whether
delegates or not, may avail themselves of
these reduced fares.

The meetings of the Convention proper
will be held in the Victoria Rifles Armory
on Cathcart street. On Sunday evening,
July 1st, there will be held a great Gospel
temperance meeting at the same point.
On Monday, 2nd, there will be an excursion
to Mystic and a Prohibition picnic there;
on Tuesday evening, 3rd, a monster Pro-
hibition mass meeting will be held. All
these gatherings will be addressed by the
foremost moral reform workers of Canada.

Already there is being manifested every-
where a deep interest in this Convention.
Its doings and sayings will be carefully
studied by the temperance party, the liquor
party and the politicians. It will make
history. The Prohibitionists are in earn-
est. The policy they are advocating must
speedily receive the careful attention of
statesmen and voters. It is being pressed
into active politics with a persistence that
will be heeded. It is behind it some of
the best brain-power in the land, it has
been warmly endorsed by different branches
of the Christian church, and it influences
the minds of an immense and growing sec-
tion of the electorate. The Montreal meet-
ing will be a gathering of men conscien-
tiously and determinedly in earnest. We
trust that in its deliberations wise counsels
will prevail, and that its results will be for
the welfare of our country and the advance-
ment of temperance, which every friend of
humanity desires to promote.
