The wife need not even be called as a colefender, because she has really no stand ing apart from her husband's desires. He must be obeyed, and if he is not the court comes to his aid. This is law, but it places married women in the position of serfs-a standing which no self-respecting husband

would care to have his wife occupy.

If a man cannot trust his wife to ociates, and cannot persuade her to do right if at any time he believes her to be doing wrong, it seems to us that confidence between the two cannot exist, and genuine marital happiness must be absent. Moreover, it is more than possible that the ability and disposition of a married woman to choose friends that will reflect credit on the household may be just as great as that of her husband.

No wonder the word "obey" in the mar-riage contract is distasteful to most self-respecting women, when its meaning is twisted by the law-makers so as to place woman in a most humiliating position in a relationship where she should be the queen, not the slave.
