THE WEATHER.

OVER A TRESTLE.

Disaster to a Baltimore and Ohio Train

WHEELING, W. Va., June 6.—It is learned that an Ohio River Railroad special train of two cars, filled with Baltimore and Ohio railroad officials en route to Wheeling, went through a trestle between nere and Parkersburg. The wreck occurred at Clarington station on the Ohio River road. The train was a special, consisting of the private Baltimore and Ohio car, "West Virginia," filled with officials of the road, who were en route from Parkesburg to Wheeling. At Clarington station the car jumped the track and went twenty feet over a trestle turning upside down. Several of the occupants of the car were badly injured, and it is almost a miracle that nobody was killed outright. The following Baltimore and Ohio officials were injured, it is not known how seriously: A. H. Johnson, civil engineer; J. F. Legg, superintendent western division; John Mock, superintendent of bridges; A. Walter, general superintendent.

THE EIGHTH WONDER.

What it Will Cost to Run the Niagara Falls.

The Niagara River Canal is expected to obst \$3,500,000 and furnish 119,000 horse-power. With coal at \$4 or \$5 a ton, the cost of one horse-power is placed at from \$39 to \$46 a year, or roughly, about ten tens of coal a year per horse-power. This canal, if it gives the estimated horse-power, will furnish a power about equal to 1,200,000 tons a year. This will cost, taking a capitalized value of 4 per cent, on the investment, \$140,000 on the first outlay and at least as much more for the maintenance and repairs. The horse-power will, therefore, be about as cheap as coal at 20 cents a ton; and it appears capable of almost indefinite expansion, unless the Falls are considered of more value than horse-power—as they are.
