

ANOTHER EPSOM RACE. LONDON, April 18 .- The city and suburban handicap was run to day at Epsom and Leg. D. Hollis' Xury second, and Baron de Rothschild's Lenicham third.

The horses got a good start, though Marpovia broke twice before the flag dropped, and Braemar after the flag fell ran into the growd and was left at the post. Xury was the quickest away and was followed in the order named by Le Nicham, Molly Morgan, Lady Hermit, Cabin Boy and Victor Wild, the others straggling along. When the 200 yards was reached Marnovia, who had rrept up, went to the front and led to the top of the hill, Lady Hermit, Cabin Boy, Molly Morgan, Xury, Victor Wild, Le Nicham and Grey Leg trailing along. Entering the straight stretch Lady Hermit took up the running, with Xury Cabin Boy and Molly Morgan just clear of her. At Crossingroad Xury led, followed by Molly Morgan, and Le Nicham. When a quarter of mile from the home Callistrate was hopelessly beaten, and Grey Leg drew into second place. At the distance Grey Leg's jockey availed himself of the opening on the rails offered by the rider of Xury, which horse he quickly overhawled and passed, winning by two and a half lengths.
The time was 2 13-15, and the distance about a mile and a quarter. Braemar was

"ROLLER BALL."

A SUBSTITUTE FOR FOOTBALL. New York Sun: "Roller ball," the inve...ion of A. H. Overman, which is intended to supersede football and its brutality, was given a trial by the training school athletes at their Alden street grounds last week. The ball used is the largest football ever made-three feet in diameter, and is filled with air, as is any kicking sphere. Although no rules have been made to regulate the game, it is understood that the ball is to be rolled or thrown over the regulation football field and through the goals.

At the first trial of the ball last Friday very little resembling a system was accomplished, but they are confident that the big ball is the nucleus of a revolution in football. At first pushing the ball was tried, the ball to remain on the ground, but with a dozen men pushing it on each side the balloon was securely anchored. Then the number of men allowed on the ball at a time was limited to two, and later on to one from each side, but the result did not seem satisfactory, as with the tackling of ordinary football there was generally a tangled mass of limbs surrounding the ball until a warning from the referee caused it to be raised in the air and juggled in the direction of the man with the longest reach. Considerable headway was made in this manner, but the whole game was devoid of anything resembling a science. > The Minister of Education Well Able to Disarm Bis Critics-Mr. Meredith "Goes For" the Brantford Blind Asylum.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, April 18.—This afternoon Dr. Meacham (Lennox) moved for a return giving the relative amounts of money paid in grants to the public schools of rural districts as compared with corporations that have high schools. Dr. Meacham objected to the basis upon which these grants were dis-

tributed. Mr. Ross maintained that the method in vogue was perfectly equitable. The grants were made according to population. If the population decreased the grant decreased. This explained why, while the grants on cities were increasing, those in the country were diminishing. Bruce and Huron, for instance, had a population now much less than twenty years ago. Dr. Meacham had asserted that the present text-books were too expensive, but the Minister of Education showed that since his assumption of office, in the the text-books for history, geography and reading there had been a saving to the people of the Province of considerably over \$100,000 annually. While at the time he took charge of the department copybooks cost 10 cents, they were now sold at 6 cents, and would be reduced to 5 cents during the coming summer, thus effecting a saving in this one particular of \$50,000 a year. Dr. Meacham also suggested that tex-books should be prepared by prison labor. Mr. Ross thought this might apply to binder twine, but was not so sure of its and keeping a clean store. application to book publishing. The Minister also showed in reply to other objections, that the standard for the fifth form twenty years ago was not as high as the fourth now. The course was thus, by long experience, found to be amply extensive. Good elementary education was all that should be expected from the public schools. Thoroughness was the chief requisite of educational methods, and the public school teachers were constantly achieving a higher standard of excellence
