Toronto, Oct. 7-11 p.m.—The storm off
the Nova Scotia coast yesterday
moved out to sea eastward, and the storm
over Lake Superior yesterday is now
central over the Ottawa Valley and is causing
a gale on the Upper Lakes. It is
showery in the same district and fine in
eastern Canada. In the Northwest high
pressure and fine cool weather prevails.

DECLINE OF THE SEAL.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 8.—The U. S.

revenue cutter Rush arrived here today

from Sitka, Alaska. She reports that the

Alaska Commercial Company has taken 15-

000 skins this season, being the full number

permitted by law. Pelagic sealers have

taken fully 35,000 more pelts from the pro-

tected zone. The officers of the Rush state

that there are further indications of a de-

crease in the herds. Favorite resorts of the

seals are now deserted.
