## In the Dining-Room.

**SATURDAY, AUG. 29**

**BREAKFAST**—Peaches, served with cream. Hashed veal with poached eggs. Graham muffins. Coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Potato salad, with cold fish. Whole tomatoes mayonnaise dressing. Wafers. Drop cakes. Iced tea.

**DINNER**—Kentucky fried chicken. Corn pudding. Cream potatoes. Broiled egg plant. Peach shortcake. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

**Kentucky Fried Chicken**—The chicken should always be dressed and kept in ice-box for at least twelve hours before using. Flour each piece and dust lightly with salt and pepper, use a level teaspoonful of salt and a quarter teaspoonful of pepper in all. The fry-pan should be half full of lard and the latter smoking hot, when the chicken is dipped in the flour and then in the oil, and fried until brown, then turn it over and fry the other side. When done, pour the fat from the pan and add a tablespoonful of butter and let brown, then stir in a tablespoonful of flour, pour in a cup of milk, add a small teaspoonful of salt, and a pinch of pepper, and let thicken. Serve gravy in a separate dish. Put little strips of fried pastry around the chicken.

**Broiled Egg Plant**—Cut the egg plant in thick slices, carefully paring each piece. Throw it in salt and water and let remain three hours. Take from the water, drain and wipe. Then butter the slices of egg plant, dip in beaten egg, then in grated cracker and broil until a light brown. Dash pepper over them and serve.

**Peach Shortcake**—Make a rich pastry. Roll thin and bake three crusts in pie-pan. Let them get thoroughly cold. Take peaches left from breakfast, mash them well and sweeten. Spread between the crusts. Put in a cold place. Serve with whipped cream. This is delicious and very inexpensive.

**BIRD WEARERS, BEWARE!**

The Audubon Society of the State of New York is conducting an active crusade against the use of the feathers of wild birds for millinery purposes, by distributing circulars, by seeking to promote an interest in the study of birds, and by otherwise agitating on the subject. It is said that the fashion of wearing feathers for ornament causes the destruction of millions of birds each year. Already the song birds of America have greatly decreased in numbers, while such birds as the beautiful, egret, snowy heron and terns, once so abundant, have become almost exterminated. The society appeals to women to refrain entirely from the use of feathers and of the wings and feathers of all wild birds. There is also perhaps a useful argument in the case, derived from the fact that many birds are destroyers of insects.

There are birds whose importation into America has been of very questionable value. This fact, however, if it is a fact, does not warrant inhumanity to the wee songsters whom the Almighty has created in such numbers.

—Mr. J. D. Shaw, of New York, traveling stationer, is spending a few days in the city, this being his first visit here in 22 years. He is much surprised at the great improvements which have taken place all over the city and the magnificent buildings that have sprung up. He also notes specially the transformation of the old barracks plots and crick ground into such a beautiful park, and the surrounding pretty streets and handsome residences.

—No. 2 committee of the board of education met last night, the following members being in attendance: Messrs. Burdick (chairman), Greenlee, Evans, Martyn and Gillian. Mr. Stevely will furnish 40 feet of furnace pipe at the Collegiate Institute. Mr. F. Love, solicitor for the board, was present, and reported that the owner of the vacant lot on Grey and Waterloo streets, having demanded a greater price than the property was worth, it would be better to appoint an arbitrator, under the act. The committee decided to recommend that such action be taken by the board. The lot includes 70 feet on Grey and 100 feet on Waterloo, which, with the boulevard allowance, would make a fine lot for a school. The board offers \$1,000, but the owner wants \$1,200.

**W. C. T. U. CONVENTIONS.**

The twenty-fourth annual convention of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union will be held in Music Hall, Buffalo, New York, Oct. 29-Nov. 3 next. It will immediately follow the fourth annual convention of the World's W. C. T. U., October 23 to 26—which, in its turn will follow the annual convention of the W. C. T. U. of the Dominion; the last two to be held in the city of Toronto, Ont. These will, without doubt, form the most remarkable trio of women's conventions ever held in this or any other country.

**CONCESSIONS BY THE G. T. R.**

An important concession has been made by the management of the G. T. R. to the heads of departments and employees generally. Mr. George B. Reeve, general traffic manager of the line, has issued a circular, informing the servants of the company that upon the certificates of heads of departments and compliance with certain conditions, the company will refund one-half of the freight charges on coal, cordwood and building material intended for the personal use of permanent employees. In order that the privilege will not prejudice other traffic arrangements, it will be necessary for the coal or cordwood to be purchased from the resident trader or merchant, whose invoice shall form the basis of refund. To facilitate payment of rebates at stations where more than one employee desires to take advantage of the concession, a secretary must be nominated through whom all rebates will be made payable. As to building material, no refund will be made on less than 2,000 pounds. Employees are warned, however, that serious consequences may ensue if the privilege is used aside to benefit other than employees.

**HOSE STUNG TO DEATH.**

At Scarborough, England, on Thursday week, Messrs. Hick and Heath, of Scarborough, were out on a run with about 200 hives of bees, to Givendale Moor, and when about three miles from the town (eight miles from Scarborough), on the route, the horse attached to the first vehicle stumbled, and this had the effect of so exciting the occupants of the hives (the jerk throwing the top off one of them) that the bees came out in large numbers, settling on the horses and stung them so violently, kicking and plunging, that the other hives were upset, this making the terrified horses break away from the wagon, and, covered by thousands of bees, ran against a wall, sank down exhausted, and soon expired. The lad, aged 16, is also very badly stung, but is under medical treatment, and will, it is hoped, be extricated. The bees retained possession of the lorry for some considerable time.

## Fell on the Pavement

**Death Followed in Four Hours.**

**Mrs. Elliott, One of London's Oldest Residents, Suddenly Called Home.**

The sudden death of Mrs. Helen H. Elliott, mother of Mr. Charles Elliott, of the firm of Elliott & Marr, last night, resulted from a fall on the pavement at the corner of Richmond and Dundas streets. Mrs. Elliott was 82 years of age, and although the injuries she received by the accident were not fatal, the shock at her time of life was so severe that death is attributed to it. It was about 8 o'clock in the evening, when the accident occurred. Mrs. Elliott, in company with Mrs. Shaw, was waiting for a South London car. Mrs. Shaw stepped away from her companion for a moment to ask a conductor which car to take. When a few feet away she turned around and noticed Mrs. Elliott's fall. The old lady had to be assisted up. A cab was summoned and Dr. Williams sent for. On the arrival of the doctor Mrs. Elliott was taken to the residence of Mrs. Andrew Greenlee, 40 Ridout street, South London, where she lived. She was conscious, and suffering a great deal, in a short while she became unconscious, and died about 11 p.m.

Deceased was born in Scotland, and came to Canada with the Strath family, with whom she was connected. Her husband, James Elliott, was a well known builder, who died many years ago. She lived for many years in Westminster township, and was one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of this vicinity. She leaves two sons, Charles, of this city, and Henry A., of Chicago, and three daughters, Mrs. George C. Doble, Mrs. James I. Anderson and Mrs. Andrew Greenlee.

**INTEREST TO BE AROUSED.**

Preparations for Earnest Work in the Methodist Church—London District Meeting.

The fall meeting of the Methodist denomination in London district, was held at the Centennial Church yesterday afternoon. Rev. George Jackson, president, presided, and the various charges were well represented by the ministers and lay delegates. Arrangements were made for holding meetings in the various churches to arouse an interest in missionary and educational schemes.

It was decided to hold a district Sunday school convention some time in February, and a committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements.

It was also decided to hold a district convention for the promotion of spiritual life and interests of the district. A committee will make arrangements as to time and place.

Resolutions of condolence with Rev. Thomas Crews in the death of his wife, and with the family of the late Rev. J. G. Laird were passed.

Three reading clubs have been organized in the district in accordance with the scheme prepared by the editor of the Christian Guardian.
