ed this morning. Apparently the space between the mountain and the river has been entrenched. South of the river the Boers have covered more ground. A few days ago their left rested on the high kopjes standing in the middle of the plain. They have now been extended two miles further south, while small kopjes stand in the plain between the center and the left, and between the center and the river, and form a ridge behind which the Boers move unseen. The weakness of the whole position, however, is that it can easily be turned either direction. The country is flat and water abounds, the recent rains having nearly filled all the dams.

GATAORE AT STORMBERG.

London, March 6.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts: "On 5th inst. Gen. Gataore occupied Stormberg yesterday. The lines of railway north and west will now be repaired. Gen. Clements is at Joubert's siding station, beyond Colesberg."

"The Duke of Marlborough, with the Oxford company of the imperial yeomanry, has left Cape Town for Naauwpoort."

"Gen. Buller reports Natal as practically clear of the enemy, and that he cannot hear of any formed body of them anywhere. The Boers left some abandoned flocks of their sick and wounded from which the Boers had been taken for transport purposes."

RHODES' "LOYALTY." London, March 6.—The Morning Leader says today: "Of one thing we may be certain. Cecil Rhodes, who knows South Africa, has made up his mind that the annexation of the republic will not bring the lasting peace which our imperialists prophesy. Mr. Rhodes is so sure this will not happen that he is prepared to set to work at once on the fortifications of Kimberley. We incline to think that Mr. Rhodes is preparing for a possible armed conflict with the imperial faction, which he fought at the polls and in parliament until 1895. He is preparing to resist any attempt on our part to interfere actively in South African affairs, either in the interests of the Dutch electors, whose vote is already threatened, or of the Kafir laborer, who seems doomed to virtual slavery. This is not, indeed, an extravagant hypothesis. Rhodes has consistently maintained a policy of 'Africa for the Afrikaner,' and on his part the latter word is synonymous with financial. He will be loyal to the English flag just so long as it continues to be a valuable commercial asset."

London Times on the Trouble in
Montreal.

Some Frenchmen Looking for a Fight With Britain.

London, March 6.—The London Times, commenting on the Montreal riots, says the incident may be reduced to its proper dimensions by reflecting that a company of Canadians at the assault on the Boer trenches on the Modder River, was wholly composed of men of French blood, who could not even speak English.

The St. James' Gazette says the incident furnishes a serious rebuke to the foolish rioters.

The papers also comment on the fact reported by the war correspondent of the Times that a Canadian company in the Paardeberg fight was wholly French Canadian, and unable to speak English.

The Daily News says: "Perhaps the wide circulation of this interesting piece of news will bring some sense and shame to those responsible for the disgraceful disturbances in Montreal. The rioters are only students, but the mischief that may be done by students when they take to quarreling on racial lines justifies public anxiety and indignation. The example of fraternity in the field should be followed in the academic grove. We hope soon to hear of peace and brotherly love again between the English and French-Canadian students."

BRITISH FLEET MOBILIZING.

London, March 6.—The mobilization of a powerful fleet began yesterday (Monday) evening at Tor Bay. Fifteen battleships and other vessels.

The St. James' Gazette publishes interviews with unnamed French diplomats and generals declaring that, in their judgment, war between England and France is inevitable.

One official of the French Government is quoted as acknowledging that France was preparing for war, and would attempt simultaneous invasion of England and South Africa. France is now strongly reinforcing Madagascar, the French point nearest Natal.

THE KAISER AND THE POPE. The Berlin Allgemeine Zeitung publishes the text of a telegram sent by Emperor William to the pope, as follows: "I beg your holiness to accept my sincere congratulations on the 90th anniversary of your birthday. I entertain the most sincere wishes for your health and happiness, and pray that God will pour down his blessings on your holiness." To this the pope replied: "In the congratulations which your majesty was good enough to address to us on the 90th anniversary of our birth, we see with pleasure fresh testimony of your friendly sentiment. Will your majesty accept our thanks, as well as the prayers which we, in our turn, offer up for the prosperity of your majesty and all the imperial family."

CABLE NOTES.

The British second-class cruiser Terrell is reported off Cat Island, in the Bahamas, with her shaft broken.

Viscount Gough, secretary of the British embassy, said the embassy knew nothing about Emperor William having sent congratulations to Queen Victoria on the occasion of the latest successes. This is confined in court circles in Berlin.

A cablegram from Adalbert Hay, the United States consul at Pretoria, indicates that he is having no trouble whatever in the full exercise of his functions, securing any information desired as to the condition of the British soldiers who are prisoners at Pretoria.
