## LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Miss Mabel Austin, of Milwaukee, is spending a few weeks with her cousin, Mr. C. W. Austin, 573 Waterloo street.

—The tail end of the waterworks delegation which started out on an "observation tour" over a week ago, arrived home about 7 o'clock last night.

—Miss May Wight, of Essex, who has been visiting Miss Clara Gummage, 338 Maitland street, during the last few days, returned home yesterday.

—Rev. J. H. Hector, the "Black Knight," will be in London next Thursday, March 8, and deliver one of his inimitable addresses. Particulars later.

—The deep interest awakened by the missionary convention just closed will doubtless draw large audiences to listen to Dr. Johnson's account of his work in Africa. This will be the only opportunity Londoners will have of listening to this remarkable man.

—Rev. Adolphe A. Durkin, O.P., who was called home to this city on account of his mother's illness, has returned to Columbus, Ohio, to where he has lately been transferred from St. Rosalia College, Springfield, Ky. Her friends will be pleased to learn Mrs. Durkin is much improved in health.

—Rev. C. H. Andrus, who is to deliver a lecture on "Midnight" evening in the "Y" room, lived for some years within sight of Mount Ararat, and, as he will show, on the site of the Garden of Eden. He will relate many interesting personal experiences such as "Catching a Tartar," "Attacked alone by 50 armed men," etc. Fine time-light views of the Rock Cities of the Gates of the East, and the costumes and people of Armenia and Georgia.

—The conversation to be held on the evening of March 22 at the auspices of the London Collegiate Institute Literary Society will undoubtedly be one of the events of the season. Already the celebrated native Canadian vocalist, Mrs. Agnes Thompson, now of Chicago, and Miss Agnes Knox, the well-known elocutionist, have been engaged at great expense and trouble, and an energetic committee is arranging for more first-class Canadian talent. Of local artists, Mr. Moron, organist, and the Opera House orchestra, under Mr. Fred Evans, have been secured. The Collegiate Glee Club, an efficient organization of over 60 voices, is being fitted out under the supervision of Mr. Charles E. Wheeler, and Principal Merchant has kindly offered to give a recital of "The Ancient Mariner," which in itself is quite a treat. It is proposed to extensively advertise the event, and with the hard work of the committee a glowing success should be the result.

Changes.  
Several changes (or removals) will take place among London's business firms during this month, as will be seen by the advertising columns of this issue. Mr. H. Beaton, the hatter, has leased the premises occupied by the Star Clothing House, and will remove there on or before the 15th inst.

The "Substitute."  
Extra Kendall's new play, "The Substitute," which is to be the attraction at the Grand on Monday, is styled a comedy-drama, and in its course adheres to this order, but is brimful of comedy from its opening to its closing scenes. Mr. Kendall has appeared so long as a laugh-maker that in constructing the new vehicle for his peculiar situation and the imaxies, are so arranged as to give prominence to the comedy element. The situations, though carried to uproariously funny climaxes, are always reasonable and at all times a part of the story.

The Choral Society.  
A well attended meeting of the London Choral Society was held last evening at R. S. Williams' music store, the object being to deal with reports from the concert committee and decide as to future intentions. The financial statement was not as satisfactory as desired, but this did not dampen the enthusiasm of the members, as they have full confidence that the society's entertainments will rapidly become popular and receive the recognition that their arduous practice deserves. It was decided to begin rehearsal at once for another grand concert to be made up of the best known sacred selections, such as the "Kyrie" and "Gloria" from Mozart's No. 12, Taubert's march and chorus (Hall: Bright Abode), Hallelujah chorus, and other equally bright compositions. Practice begins next week, and the members are requested to bring along all copies of Gilmore's Festival Chorus book which they may have. A committee was also appointed to secure more commodious rooms for the practice.

## Prohibition Next Meeting.

On Friday evening next the first mass meeting of the London and Western Ontario Prohibition Union will be held at the Somerset Hall, commencing at 8 o'clock. A general invitation is given to the public to attend. All who come will be welcome. Among the speakers expected from a dis-

tance are the Rev. Dr. Mackay, of Woodstock, one of the best known prohibition workers in Ontario; Rev. Principal Austin, of Alma College; St. Thomas, also a prominent worker for many years; Hon. Senator Vidal, of Sarnia, the leader of the Prohibitionists in the Dominion Senate, and probably Rev. Dr. Aylsworth, of Highgate, president of the London Methodist Conference.

The W. C. T. U. have also been invited to take part and provide a musical programme and a speaker. If there is time some of the well known local workers of the union will also address the meeting. Probably a collection will be asked to assist in defraying the expenses. A pleasant and profitable meeting may be looked for, and there should be a large attendance. The meetings will inaugurate an important campaign.

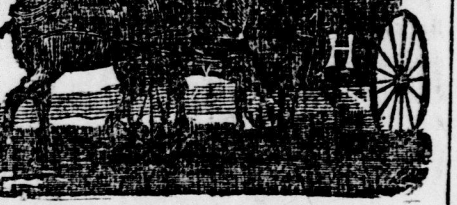
