Another notable sale was made in the swine department, where D. C. Flatt & Sons, of Millgrove, Ont., sold

Toronto, Dec. 7 .- One thousand head of yearling cattle will be shipped to British Columbia within the next ten days. These have been purchased in the district northeast of Toronto by G. H. Hadwin, secretary of the Dairymen's and Live Stock Company, of British Columbia, who is in the city This will be the first experiment of its kind sent from Toronto and this section to the Pacific province, four hundred head having been shipped from Ottawa about two weeks ago. For these cattle Mr. Hadwin paid from months for probably \$40 or \$45 each. There is an abundant stock in Ontario," said Mr. Hadwin, "and I see no reason why an immense cattle trade should not be worked up between these provinces."
