MAN WHO BROKE THE BANK

Detroit Jury Find Frank C. Andrews Guilty.

Fraudulently Misapplied Funds of the City Savings Bank.

Detroit, Aug. 13.—What was probably one of the greatest legal battles ever fought in the criminal courts of Michigan, came to a close Saturday afternoon, when Frank C. Andrews, vice-president of the wrecked City Savings Bank and ex-police commissioner, was found guilty, by a jury of his peers, of willfully misapplying the funds of the bank. The verdict was announced shortly after 2 o'clock, and ten minutes later Andrews was taken to the county jail to await sentence. That he was surprised and stunned by the finding of the jury could be seen plainly, but he made no sign of weakening or breaking down. SKY-SCRAPERS FOR PARIS

City Council Has Abolished the Height Limit.

Innovation Unwelcome But Becomes a Commercial Necessity.

Paris, Aug. 13.—Sky-scraper, so long a nightmare to sensitive Parisians, are destined to become a reality. A few practically inclined architects who have been making strong efforts to induce the city to adopt a more utilitarian building standard, met with success at a recent meeting of the council, when a decree was signed, taking off the restricted limit on the height of buildings in the business district.

The new rule also permits further emancipation in the form of artistic extensions and projections beyond the old building lines—an innovation capable of causing the other Parisians to be jealous. While they declare that the architects and city fathers to turn in their graves with horror. M. Bouvard, director of the city architectural department, and M. Bonnier, architect attached to the Elysee Palace, are the originators of the movement which has resulted in the decree. The latter has become "a fantastic middle like New York or Chicago," they also assert that the measure responds to a great need of the times. "Already several scores of requests have been received for permission to erect fifteen or twenty stories," said M. Bonnier. "The wholesale district, especially the Rue Reaumur and the Rue Montmartre, will probably be transformed within a few years. The innovation will likely prove unwelcome to the majority of Parisians, but it represents a commercial necessity of the times, and the city fathers are not to be easily deterred by popular opinion. No opposition has been made to the bill, which will quickly become law."

CONSPIRACY SUSPECTED

Sum of \$28,000 Missing—Express Agent Claims He Was Robbed.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 13.—A special from Owensboro, Ky., says: The agent of the American Express Company at Fordville was robbed of \$28,000 last night under peculiar circumstances. J. W. Boatner, who shipped the money to Fordville, is under arrest at Irvington, and J. C. Schlitzbaum, the agent of the company, is being held at Falls of Rough. Several days ago a man giving the name as J. W. Boatner, of Memphis, Tenn., appeared at the office of the American Express Company at Falls of Rough, five miles from Fordville, and wanted to express \$30,000 to the latter point. Boatner took a receipt for it and then the agent remembered that he was allowed to ship only \$5,000 at one time, and made him take the cash back. Boatner kept the money until last night, when it was sent to Fordville by express, where it arrived last night. The express agent, it is said, informed a number of people that the money had arrived. It was not put in bank, as Mr. Boatner sent word that he would be there early this morning. This morning Schlitzbaum turned up at Falls of Rough, ten miles away. He stated that he was held up, robbed and kidnapped during the night. He first decided to stay at the depot all night, he says, but finally got nervous and started to the hotel, which is only one square away. Between the two places he was set upon and robbed of the money by three men. The express people and the agent believe that the whole affair was a conspiracy to defraud the American Express Company out of \$28,000. Boatner is now under arrest at Irvington, Ky.

BEST IN 23 YEARS!

Manitoba Farmers Expect to Reap a Record-Breaking Crop.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 13.—Hugh McKellar, of the department of agriculture, returned to the city Saturday from a trip to the country around Pilot Mound and Clearwater.

"My object," said Mr. McKellar, "was to see how the crops were ripening, and to pick up pointers in regard to locating harvest hands. Many farmers whom I interviewed at their homes in that district, say that in all their 23 years' experience, they have never had the promise of such a crop. Quite a number of fields of barley are cut, also oats, and an occasional wheat field. About the last of next week the binders will be started on nearly every farm, and by the following Monday harvesting will be in full swing. The arrival of harvest hands, therefore, will be at the proper time for this district, although the department is receiving letters from districts further west saying that cutting will be general the coming week, and that many hands are now wanted."

WILL HANDLE MUCH GRAIN.

Montreal, Que., Aug. 13.—D. D. Mann, of the Canadian Northern Railway, who is here, said the first through passenger train between Port Arthur and Winnipeg will start early this week, after which there will be a regular daily service each way. Mr. Mann also spoke of the Canadian Northern's ability to handle the crop tributary to the system. "Up to date," he said, "we have brought out 9,000,000 bushels of last year's crop, and we are expected to increase it to 14,000,000 bushels. Last year we had elevator capacity for two million, and this year by the time the crop comes in, our capacity will reach 6,000,000. Our hauling capacity has also been increased by 25 locomotives and 800 cars."

Mr. Elliott, rector of the Episcopal Church at Tyrconnell.

A majority of the acquaintances of the contracting parties were surprised at the announcement of the marriage, but there were several who were acquainted with the state of affairs, although they were kept in ignorance of the date. It has been known for some time that the two were engaged, but no cards were issued announcing the event.

CITY DELUGED BY TIDAL WAVE

No Less Than Thirty Persons Known to Have Perished.

SEVERAL TOWNS WASHED AWAY

Cloudbursts Do Great Damage in Virginia—Kentucky Suffers From Storms.

Culican, Mexico, Aug. 13.—The lower portion of the city of Atlatla, on the Pacific coast, just west of Culican, has been completely destroyed by a tidal wave, and not less than thirty people are known to have been drowned. The loss of life may be several times that number. The property loss is heavy. It is reported that several smaller coast towns situated above Atlatla were completely washed away by the same tidal wave, and that the loss of life in these smaller places is very heavy. Relief for the sufferers at Atlatla will be sent from Culican, and it is expected that state and federal governments will take prompt action for the destitute.

BAD STORMS IN KENTUCKY. Cincinnati, Aug. 13.—Terrorific storms occurred last night in different parts of Kentucky. Fulton and Cayce report tornadoes doing much damage in those localities.

William Goforth and Auce Renfro were killed by contact with wires that had been blown down, and John Whittaker, Charles Haskins and Lill France were badly injured.

CLOUDBURSTS IN VIRGINIA.

HOW TO PRESERVE CHEESE

Important Work Being Carried On By the Government.

Cheese in Curing Rooms Is Now Dipped in Melted Paraffin Wax.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 13.—A work of considerable importance to the cheese industry is being carried out at the government cool cheese-curing rooms under the supervision of J. A. Rudick, chief of the dairy division of the department of agriculture. All the cheese at these curing rooms are now dipped in melted paraffin wax as soon as they are received, by which process the cheese are covered with a thin, impervious coating that improves their appearance, reduces the shrinkage, and effectually prevents the growth of mould or staining of the surface of the cheese.

Mr. Rudick has been experimenting for some time with a view of determining the right quality of wax to use, the proper temperature to have it when the cheese are dipped and the best means of carrying out the work expeditiously and with the least possible labor and expense. Special apparatus has been devised, and the work is in full swing at all of the four cool-curing rooms established by the government this season. This practice has been tried before, but so far as is known, it has not been successfully applied to Canadian cheddar cheese of the regular size, when cured at the temperature of an ordinary cheese-curing room. The heating of the cheese and consequent swelling and exudation of fat causes the wax to peel off.

It is hardly expected, therefore, that the cheese factory with an ordinary curing room can adopt this method of treating their cheese, although experiments are now being conducted to determine this point. But Mr. Rudick expects that it will prove to be one of the greatest of the advantages to be derived from the cool curing of cheese.

MONEY GOES ASTRAY

\$3,375,000 in Undelivered Letters in British Postoffice.

London, Aug. 13.—The annual report of the postmaster-general shows that the large total of \$3,375,000 was found in letters undelivered during the past year. The undelivered letters totalled no less than ten million, while the delivered missives amounted to 2,451,500, an average of 59.9 for each person in the United Kingdom. The postmaster-general also reports that fresh experiments in motor cars showed that they cannot be relied upon to carry heavy loads of mail matter with the same regularity as wagons drawn by horses.
