## SCORED THE GOVERNMENT.

Rev. A. K. Birks Disapproves of Premier Ross' Bill.

Papers and Clergymen Who Oppose Prohibition Also Come in for Condemnation.

Rev. A. K. Birks, of Colborne Street Methodist Church, preached upon prohibition last night to an audience which filled the auditorium of the church. Mr. Birks threw some hot shot into the government, the press and the clergymen who do not favor prohibition.

Speaking of the Ross Government, Mr. Birks said that it had broken every vow and violated every pledge made to the prohibitionists. No wonder, he said, that there is so much bribery and corruption at elections when men standing so high in their party will break solemn pledges with impunity and throw their promises to the winds when they get in a tight place. Premier Ross should have stood like a man to his guns. He should have brought in a straight prohibition measure, if not with the sanction of his ministry, at least with the approval of the people. If Whitney was returned to office and if defeated in the house, he could have gone to the country with his bill. The prohibitionists, said the speaker, would have rallied to his support and returned him with a larger support than any Liberal premier in Ontario had yet had.

Mr. Birks advised prohibitionists to express their sentiments in the coming election. Either by voting for Conservative candidates or by refraining from casting a ballot they could show their disapproval of the Ross Government. If Whitney was returned to power, and if he refused to give prohibition, then prohibitionists should unite against him and turn him down also. The prohibitionists should show the politicians that their vote is strong enough to put parties in or out of power. What is needed is more temperance in politics and less politics in temperance.

Speaking of the newspapers, Mr. Birks expressed surprise that not a daily in London had come out straight-forwardly and solidly for prohibition. He regretted that prohibitionists could not get their side of the question before the public, because the newspapers have no consideration for temperance principles. He advocated the boycotting by prohibitionists of the newspapers which did not support prohibition.

Mr. Birks said that the clergyman who did not favor prohibition was an anomaly and a curiosity. Speaking of Principal Grant's views on prohibition and his advocacy of more rigid restriction instead of prohibition, Mr. Birks said that no one understood Principal Grant's system, not even himself.

The balance of Mr. Birks' sermon covered well-beaten ground. At its close a member of the congregation arose and gave his testimony to the fact that he had abstained from drinking, having lived five years in North Dakota, where it was in operation.
