They Believe There Is No Cause for Fear-Forty Came Ashore Friday Night.

Bay City, Mich., March 1 .- The condition of the fishermen on the ice floe in Saginaw Bay today is the same as last night, with the exception of about 40, who came ashore last midnight through the aid of a boat run out by William Houser from his fishery on the shore. Mr. Houser crossed the open water several times and landed the men safely, and they came up to the Oak Grove resort, where some of them remain. Speaking of the ice going out, one of the men said this afternoon: "We noticed the ice began moving at 3 o'clock, and those of us who wanted to get ashore started to the south and were taken from the ice by Houser. The others remained in their shantles and will stay out on the ice until it is blown back or until they are satisfied there is to be no more fishing. The ice is from 18 to 24 inches thick, unusually solid considering the warm weather, and there is no danger of it going to pieces. If it does not break up the fishermen will be safe. In case they wanted to get ashore now they could mostly old, experienced hands and know when to make a bee line for shore. They will probably remain out there for two weeks longer. J. L. Fisk, the fish buyer, who went out with his team of horses every other day, barely escaped being caught on the runaway ice. He crossed the big crack on his way in with a load of

fish at noon, and three hours later the ice went out." The shanties are mostly on the north and west side of the crack in the ice, and while they cannot get ashore with-out boats in the vicinity of Sebewaing, it is thought the ice on the north shore of the bay is intact, in which case the men are in no danger except by reason of small open fissures. Paul Fouriner, of Essexville, who came ashore at Sebewaing today, does not expect that the men will experience much difficulty in getting ashore un-
