STRONG OPPOSITION TO THE PEACE MOVEMENT

By the Irreconcilables Under Delarey.

Trio of the Dewets Sentenced by Treason Court.

Kitchener Tells of the Bravery of British Troops at Brakenlaagte.

Pretoria, May 6.—Considerable opposition to the peace movement is developing among the irreconcilables of Gen. Delarey's force. At the same time it is claimed that the peace situation is developing encouragingly. According to reliable information which has reached here, several of the nearer commandos have received the burgher delegates in an amicable spirit. It is understood that Commandant Beyers has announced his willingness to abide by the decision reached by the Transvaal Government.

TWO OF THE DEWETS SENTENCED.

London, May 7.—A dispatch from Allwal North, Cape Colony, says the treason court in session there has sentenced David Dewet to pay a fine of £500 or serve a year's imprisonment. Pieter Dewet has been found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of £1,000 or serve two years in prison. A previous telegram declared that Pieter Dewet had been acquitted.

PRINSLOO GETS AWAY.

A dispatch from Pretoria says Commandant Prinsloo, who surrendered to the British and was after-

wards captured by the Boers, has escaped.

BRavery of BRITISH AT BRAKENLAAGTE.

The Gazette prints a lengthy dispatch from Lord Kitchener, dealing with the operations in South Africa. From the list of officers and men whose kit-charge Lord Kitchener wishes to bring to favorable notice, the following who proved themselves heroes at Brakenlaagte are singled out: Sergeant J. R. Hayes, lying wounded across the trail of his gun, all the rest of the gun detachment being killed or wounded, ascertained that the gun was loaded, got the lanyard, crawled up the trail and fired the gun, falling immediately after from weakness.

Corporal E. Atkin, promoted sergeant by commander-in-chief. In same action, all his detachment being shot down, and himself wounded, stood up and endeavored to remove the breech block, and was again wounded in both hands. Acting Bombardier H. Cook (promoted corporal by commander-in-chief). Drivers G. Little, J. Saunders, E. Lloyd and T. Hopkins, the latter promoted bombardier by commander-in-chief. In same action, seeing the men and horses at the gun shot down, on his own initiative unlimbered the wagon, which was about 100 yards in rear, and with the help of the other men mentioned took the limber up, but before they reached the gun they and all horses were shot down.

KITCHENER'S SHREWD MOVE.

London, May 7.—A Pretoria letter dated April 13, is printed. Describing the Boer delegates, the writer says that they all like and respect Gen. Kitchener, and fear him to a great extent. It was expected that State Secretary Reitz would prove troublesome, but Gen. Kitchener bagged him as an interpreter, keeping him so busy that he did not have leisure to make speeches.

NO DOUBT THAT WAR IS OVER.

May 7.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Johannesburg says that the refugees burghers appear to entertain no doubts that the war will end shortly. The military authorities are somewhat pessimistic.

600 CANADIAN SOLDIERS WILL BE AT CORONATION

Each Corps in Canada To Be Represented.

30,000 Norwegians Booked for the United States.

Spain and France Visited by Severe Earthquake Shocks—Keen Interest in Canadian Fast Mail Negotiations.

Minister of Militia Borden explained in the Dominion House yesterday that the Canadian coronation force would be 600 strong, officers and men—one-half infantry, and the other half cavalry.

The Mounted Police and Strathcona's Horse would be represented in the cavalry. The district officer commanding will choose the men—four from each corps and one each from each of the smaller infantry corps and two from each of the larger infantry corps. There will be 22 officers, and the force will sail from Quebec, June 7. The war office will supply the horses on the other side.

30,000 NORWEGIAN EMIGRANTS.

A Christiania dispatch says: Thirty thousand emigrants are booked to sail for the United States during the season of 1902.

CANADIAN FAST MAIL SCHEME.

In view of the Morgan shipping trust news is anxiously awaited in London of the progress of the Canadian fast mail negotiations.

Mr. Balfour's statement in the House of Commons shows that the British ministers are keenly alive to the necessity of strong imperial action to checkmate the trust.

The belief is expressed in influential circles that Canada never had a better chance of securing the fullest co-operation of the British Government in the creation of a jointly subsidized service, but, as a high authority said today, Canada merely wastes breath by suggesting anything short of the best New York can boast.

The same authority declared that no time should be lost, for if Canada does not mean business with a Canadian service, Anglo-American capitalists are expected soon to seize the chance with a subsidized British-New York service outside the trust.

EARTHQUAKES.

Violent earthquake shocks were reported from Bordeaux, Bayonne, Pau and other places in the same region of France on Tuesday. They lasted 15 seconds. The reports do not mention any damage.

Earthquake shocks were felt also at Barcelona, Saragossa, Irun, Tafalla and Murci, Spain. At the last named place the cathedral and the convent, as well as a number of houses, were damaged.

The population became panic-stricken. At Alberique, in Valencia Province, a number of houses were destroyed,

Colquhoun's term of service had expired, and Sunderland was invalided home. Both are in good health now and speak with enthusiasm of their experiences in the land of velvet and enteric. During their engagement as scouts the Canadians saw plenty of fighting. They were in the hot engagement at Taffi Kop, on Dec. 20, when 48 members of Damant's Horse, with which they were, were killed or mortally wounded.

READY TO SAIL.

Hallfax, N. S., May 7.—The Third Regiment of the C. M. R., Col. Williams in command, was inspected yesterday by Major-General O'Grady-Hay, who expressed himself much pleased with the men's appearance.

There seems to be some doubt as to the Cestrian getting away on the scheduled date, Thursday. The troop of scouts has been in the city since the flooded over and woodwork has been set in the covering overhead, on which to affix the hammock cots. The horses will be on the deck above the troops.

The ship will be provisioned for forty days, and large refrigerators have been built for the fresh meat. Three and a half pounds of meat, salt and fresh, for each man, is the allowance, and accordingly, about 100,000 pounds of meat will be taken along. Fresh water enough for the trip will be taken on board, so that it will not be necessary to use condensed water.

There will be no carrying capacity for more than enough for every soul on board the ship. The meals will all be cooked on board every day, a big staff of cooks having been engaged.

The Cestrian has been in the harbor by the imperial board and passed, and it is now ready, so far as the accommodations are concerned, to receive the troops. At the terminus it is thought the Cestrian will not sail before Friday or Saturday.
