Manager of a Syracuse Ball Team Receives a Fatal Shock.

Harrisburg, Pa., May 7.-Four men were killed, two were fatally injured and two others were terribly burned by being caught in a torrent of molten metal Monday night in an open hearth pit at the Pennsylvania Steel Works, in the dual capacity of father confesat Steelton, near here. All of the men were Austrians.

The two dying men are burned from head to foot. The men were at work in a pit behind the "checkers," when the iron either boiled over or the furnace burned out, and the entire pit was turned into a pool of fire. The pit boss, Charles F. Lockett, gave a cry of warning as the iron commenced to flow into the pit, and three of the laborers heeded his cry and escaped fatal injury. The others, thinking evidently that the overflow was a slight one, similar to those which occur frequently at the furnaces, pressed against the side of the pit and were caught in the awful flood.
