### Russian Fleet Sails.

London, Nov. 1. - A dispatch from Vigo says the Russian fleet sailed from here at 9 o'clock this morning.

London, Oct. 31 .- Foreign Secretary Lansdowne and Count Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador, further discussed the composition of the international commission, which will inquire into the North Sea incident. Subequently there was a meeting of the cabinet. It is understood that Ambassador Benckendorff complained of Premier Balfour's attack on Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky during his speech at Southampton, Friday. The foreign secretary, however, declined to consider the matter, as not coming within his province. Mr. Balfour had an hour's audience with King Edward. The convention being arranged between Great Britain and Russia with the view of the establishment of an international commission to investigate the facts in the North Sea incident


